**W. C. T. U. Notes**  
**COUNTY TEMPERANCE ACT**  
**DECLARED OUT OF ORDER**  
 Last week in the Nova Scotia leg-  
 islature the County Temperance  
 Act, sponsored by the Sons of Tem-  
 perance, was declared out of order.  
 Dr. H. R. Grant commenting on the  
 fate of the act said:  
 "The stand of the Social Service  
 Council and Temperance Alliance  
 on the question of temperance is  
 well known.  
 "I. We have always advocated  
 total abstinence from the beverage  
 use of alcohol, whether in beer,  
 wine or other liquors, because its  
 use causes diminished efficiency of  
 body and mind and enfeeblement  
 of moral control.  
 "2. We have contended that it  
 is not right for a Government to  
 sanction by law a traffic that in-  
 creases crime, wastes the national  
 resources, corrupts the social habits  
 and destroys the health and lives  
 of the people.  
 "3. The bill sponsored by the  
 Sons of Temperance—not by the  
 Social Service Council and Tem-  
 perance Alliance—has not been ac-  
 cepted by the Legislature. How-  
 ever, with united effort by social  
 welfare and temperance workers,  
 and in response to the conviction  
 throughout the Province that con-  
 ditions, under present legislation,  
 are far from satisfactory, we are  
 confident that, in a short time,  
 electors will be given an opportu-  
 nity to vote for the abolition of the  
 sale of liquor.  
 "The social, moral and economic  
 well being of Nova Scotia demands  
 the overthrow of the liquor traffic,  
 and the day is not far distant  
 when this will be accomplished."

taking of the Social Service Council  
 and Temperance Alliance in  
 endeavoring to secure this amend-  
 ment were passed from time to  
 time during the year by County  
 and local Social Service Councils  
 and various Church bodies.  
 Sentiment in favor of the propos-  
 ed amendment was strong through-  
 out the province.  
 We had hoped that before ac-  
 tion with members of the House,  
 Liberal and Conservative, to have  
 the Bill introduced in a constitu-  
 tional manner, and the requisite  
 preparation was made.  
 5. After we had completed ar-  
 rangements for the introduction  
 of our Bill, we received notice from  
 the Field Secretary of the Sons of  
 Temperance that a Bill entitled  
 "The County Temperance Act"  
 would be introduced by the Sons  
 of Temperance.  
 From the press a few days later  
 we learned that the Bill would not  
 be introduced as an amendment to  
 the Control Act, but as a separate  
 statute.  
 We had hoped that before action  
 would be taken to introduce either  
 Bill a conference might be arranged.  
 We did not wish to have placed  
 before the Legislature two differ-  
 ent County Option Bills. How-  
 ever, the conference was not ar-  
 ranged. The Sons of Temperance  
 Bill was introduced. Before ac-  
 tion was taken on the Bill in the  
 Legislature we had decided that  
 our Bill, calling for an amendment

**COUNTY OPTION LEGISLATION**  
 Statement by Social Service  
 Council and Temperance Alliance.  
 As enquiries have come to hand  
 within the past few days regard-  
 ing the attitude of temperance or-  
 ganizations to the question of  
 County Option and legislative ac-  
 tion, we submit the following state-  
 ment:  
 1. The temperance forces of this  
 province, that stand for total  
 abstinence and the suppression of  
 the liquor traffic, are of one mind  
 as to the reasonableness of electors  
 in any County being permitted to  
 vote for or against the sale of li-  
 quor. All favor the principle of  
 County Option.  
 2. With reference to the meth-  
 od of obtaining the necessary  
 legislation there is a difference of  
 opinion.  
 The Social Service Council and  
 Temperance Alliance for the past  
 year carried on work to obtain an  
 amendment to the Control Act to  
 provide for County Option. In  
 June we presented our case to the  
 Government.  
 3. The W. C. T. U. a unit in  
 the Social Service Council, at its  
 last convention in September, pas-  
 sed a resolution calling upon the  
 Government to so amend the Con-  
 trol Act.  
 The I. O. G. T., also a unit in our  
 organization, stands for such  
 amendment.

 WASHINGTON, May 13—Pres-  
 ent Hoover today vetoed the Demo-  
 cratic tariff bill, which would have  
 altered the flexible provision by re-

 import duty rates.  
 The President announced his re-  
 jection of the measure in a pro-  
 tracted message to the Demo-  
 cratic House of Representatives, which or-

 As already announced, the death

 exemplary habits. He was very pop-  
 ular with his companions and asso-  
 ciates, and his untimely passing will,  
 therefore, be deeply mourned. But  
 it is in the home circle, especially,  
 that his gentle presence will be  
 missed. Here fond memories of the  
 dear familiar face and the manly  
 form that have gone will long re-  
 main.  
 His death was peaceful. During  
 those trying days of sickness he  
 made a beautiful preparation for the  
 closing hour which he already knew  
 was slowly but inevitably drawing  
 near. He devoted pastor, the Rev.  
 P. D. McGulgan, was in almost  
 daily attendance, and administered  
 the sacred rites of the Church. This
