—RINK ENJOYED.—The Tignish Rink opened during the holidays. Mr. Fred Bernard, manager, is handing out a fine brand of ice so good indeed that many of the juniors are prepared to undergo the most rigorous treatment if caught indulging after seven o'clock. Let us hope they make good their escape. The hockeyists are practicing and are apparently in good shape. The line up this year, greatly embellished by the appearance of Mr. Ralph Hackett, one of the last year Crystal Stars. Let us hope he remains with us for the season.

—CUSTOMS CASE—A case from the west was tried under the Customs Act before Messrs. Campbell and Palmer, Justice of the Peace, on Saturday in Mr. Campbell's office. Mr. A. C. Saunders appeared for the Customs and Mr. C. D. McCallum for the defence. The case occupied the greater part of the day. The defendant was charged with having spirits in his possession unlawfully manufactured. A gallon can was found on his premises, containing about a quart of spirits, which on analysis proved to be above the strength allowed by law. After hearing the evidence the magistrates fined defendant \$200 and costs. The amount was paid into court, the defendant contending however that he was not guilty.

—GREAT WORK.—The Telegraph line between Summerside and Tignish which was so badly damaged as a result of the storm was soon got into shape. Mr. Ray Steele, the regular line man, left Summerside Tuesday morning with four men and, despite the fact that he repaired 64 breaks between Summerside and Miscouche, he kept plugging at almost superhuman speed and had the line repaired and through to Tignish by 5 o'clock the same evening. This was a distinct accomplishment for Mr. Steele and he deserves every credit for opening the line in such short time. The line had been down on Monday and Tuesday, the telegraph instruments in the various R. K. Stations were useless and no one knew where the trains were or when they would get in.

—WANT NEW STATION.—The Summerside Journal says:—A very representative delegation of the citizens of Summerside, headed by Mr. Mayor, waited on Superintendent T. B. Grady in his private car here on Wednesday evening, with the object of having a new station built in Summerside this summer. It will be remembered that when Mr. W. U. Appleton, the General Manager of the Atlantic Region was here some little time ago, he stated that the railway management had decided to build a new station. Mr. Grady confirmed this at the conference and also stated that he had included sufficient in the estimates to build a suitable station in keeping with the town. He also stated that as soon as the money was obtained the work no doubt would be commenced. Plans are being prepared and no doubt will be submitted to the ones interested before the work is begun. The only thing that stands in the way now is having the amount voted at the next session of Parliament and it is to be hoped this will be done. With an improved Water Street and an up-to-date station, Summerside will take its place as one of the progressive towns of the Maritimes.

Some twenty-five years ago she went to Cambridge, Mass., where she has resided since that time, having been married to Mr. Frederick W. Ritzau in 1911. She leaves to mourn, besides her husband, one daughter, Louise C., aged 14 years, and one son, Frederick M., aged 12 years. The remains were laid to rest in the Cambridge cemetery on the afternoon of Sunday, the 9th inst.

—THE GREAT SILVER FREEZE.—It may sound platitudeous to remark on the immense coat of ice covering everything exposed to the elements on Saturday night and Sunday. Everyone knows it and everyone is getting his or her "share" of it. A sublime manifestation of the elementary forces of Nature, if one is inclined to regard it in an aesthetic sense. If one had the poetic imagination of an Oliver Wendell Holmes or a James Whitcomb Riley, it might be capitalized into a wonderful attraction for winter tourists to P. E. Island. Other places make capital out of lesser natural phenomena. Counting twenty tons to the acre would mean that about 25,000,000 (twenty five millions) of tons of ice was spread over P. E. I. The sublimity of nature is costly to some people. The P. E. I. telephone Co. will probably be "set back" \$10,000 on account of destruction of posts and wires. Fruit and ornamental trees will suffer almost incalculable damage. People should follow the advice of W. L. Cotton and plant more trees at regular intervals by roads and fences in order to offset devastations of this kind. K.

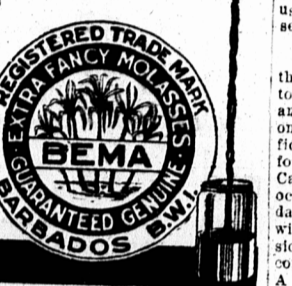

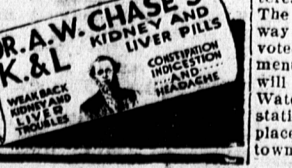
NORTH CAROLINA HAS AN EVOLUTION PROBLEM
