CH'TOWN YACHT CLUB
OUT FOR BANNER YEAR

First Race of Season Will be Held on June 3rd.—Number of New Boats to Make Appearance—Two Cups Already Donated.

When it was announced at the recent meeting of the Charlottetown Yacht Club that the first race of the season would be held on June 3rd, much enthusiasm was evidenced not only by boat owners and members of the Club, but by followers of the sport generally. This year it is the intention of the Club to make the coming one the best since its inauguration. New yachts will make their appearance this year and much conjecture is manifest as to how the newcomers will shape up against last year's craft.

A word may be said here with regard to this Club and its maintenance and boosting by citizens. It is a known fact that the C. Y. C. depends at the present time for its upkeep on membership fees only, and said membership is none too large at that. Therefore it is the intention of the Club to put on a membership drive in the near future and it is hoped that our citizens and lovers of the yacht racing game will respond nobly.

The two first cups for racing to be donated this year are those put up by Messrs Lloyd Wellner and John Hearn and needless to say the C. Y. C. is very grateful to the above mentioned gentlemen.

The following is the constitution and a number of important by-laws of the Club:

CONSTITUTION

Name

This Association shall be known as the "Charlottetown Yacht Club."

Objects

The objects of the Club shall be to promote yacht building and sailing, and to encourage its members in becoming proficient in seamanship, in the personal management, control and handling of yachts and other craft, to establish and enforce uniform rules for the government of all races, and to provide the necessary club accommodation. The Club shall stand for clean sport in all aquatic lines, and to encourage citizens and visitors to enjoy the use of our beautiful harbor and the surrounding waters.

Meetings

There shall be two regular meetings in each year. The first, which shall be the Annual Meeting, shall be held on the first Wednesday in May, and the second, on the first Wednesday in November.

Should any such date be a legal holiday, the meeting shall be held on the day following.

Special meetings may be called at any time by the Commodore, and shall be called by him on written request of at least ten members.

Elections

The officers of the Club shall be elected by ballot at the Annual Meeting in May of each year, and shall hold office for one year, or until their successors shall be elected. A majority of the votes cast shall be necessary to elect an officer.

The Executive Committee of nine members shall be elected at the same Meeting. As soon as practicable after the Annual Meeting, the Flag Officers, Secretary-Treasurer, and the Executive Committee shall meet, and choose from their number three members, not owners of competing boats, to act as a Sailing Committee for the ensuing year. In the event of any member of the Sailing Committee being unable to act at any race, the Officers and Executive shall choose another member to fill the vacancy so occurring.

Voting

Proposals to fix or alter rule of measurement or classification of Yachts shall be submitted to the November general meeting of the Club, and after open discussion, the question shall be decided by a vote of the owners of sailboats enrolled. Each Yacht shall be entitled to one vote only, but no member, by reason of owning more than one yacht, shall be entitled to more than one vote. This classification as adopted at the November meeting shall be effective for one year. On all other questions, all members in good standing shall be entitled to vote.

Commodore

It shall be the duty of the Commodore to take command of the Squadron, to preside at Meetings of the Club, and of the Executive Committee, and to enforce all the laws and regulations of the Club. He may call special Meetings of the Club whenever he shall deem it necessary, and he shall do so on the written request of ten members.

Vice Commodore

It shall be the duty of the Vice Commodore to assist the Commodore in the discharge of his duties, and to officiate in his absence.

Rear Commodore

It shall be the duty of the Rear

Secretary-Treasurer

It shall be the duty of the Secretary-Treasurer to keep a true record of the Meetings of the Club with the names of the members thereat, in a book to be provided for that purpose.

To keep a correct roll of all members, showing their standing. To notify each member, of every special, regular and adjourned meeting of the Club, by mailing to his address a notice of the same. The Secretary-Treasurer shall cause to be posted up at the headquarters of the club, a notice giving the date, hour and special business of such meeting, and when possible give publicity of coming meetings through the press.

To file all documents, records, reports and communications connected with the business of the Club.

To keep a correct list of the name, measurement, ownership, rig, builder and designer of all yachts enrolled in the squadron, and also a record of the races sailed during the season.

In case of inability to attend any Meeting, he shall cause the books and papers to be conveyed to the place of meeting.

He shall collect all dues, assessments and other moneys payable to the Club, and shall pay out such amounts as the Executive Committee shall vote.

He shall make a report to the Club of the amount of money in his hands at any time when requested by the Commodore or the Executive to do so; and at the regular general Meetings in May and November he shall furnish a statement of all his receipts and disbursements.

Executive Committee

The executive Committee shall consist of the Flag Officers, the Secretary-Treasurer (ex officio), and nine elective members. Seven members to constitute a quorum.

The Commodore and Secretary-Treasurer shall be (ex officio) the chairman and Secretary, respectively.

It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to supervise, control and conduct all the business affairs of the club.

To approve, before the payment thereof, all accounts and bills rendered against the club, and such approval shall be the warrant of the Secretary-Treasurer for the payment thereof.

At least two days before each annual meeting to appoint Auditors—members of the club not holding office—whose duties shall be to examine the books of the Secretary-Treasurer, and to submit in writing at the next annual meeting a full report of such examination.

On such report being accepted, the auditors shall be considered discharged.

To keep a record of all its proceedings and to submit a written report thereof at the annual meetings.

Boat owners may appeal to Flag Officers and Executive for final decision on protests.

The Executive Committee shall have power to postpone any fixture or alter any prize, whenever they shall deem it necessary in the interest of the Club to do so.

Notice of any alteration in the fixtures, prizes or courses for the season shall at once be sent by the Secretary-Treasurer to every owner of a yacht registered with the club.

The Executive Committee shall meet at the call of the chair. No proxies shall be allowed.

Sailing Committee

It shall be the duty of the Sailing Committee, subject to the Sailing Regulations adopted by the Club to supervise, manage and control all races held under the auspices of the club.

To decide all questions, controversies and disputes relating to the facts of any race or races, or incidental thereto, or relating to the construction or interpretation of any of the Sailing Regulations or the applicability of any of the said regulations to any existing state of facts. The committee shall decide all attempts to win a race by means other than fair sailing and superior speed and skill.

The decisions or findings of the Sailing Committee upon questions of fact shall be absolutely final—on questions of construction, interpretation or applicability, such decisions shall also be final.

No member of the Sailing Committee shall take part in a discussion on, or decision of, a disputed question in which he is directly interested.

The Sailing Committee shall appoint the courses, time of start, time limit, and be officers of the day for each race and shall submit a report of all races to the club at the November general meeting.

The Sailing Committee shall have power, in case of unfavorable weather conditions, to postpone any race held under the auspices of the club, or to cancel any race held under the auspices of the Club for more than

that has been started if indications seem to warrant the assumption that the race cannot be finished within the time allowance announced or that the weather conditions make the continuance of the race dangerous to the lives of those concerned.

In the event of any cup or prize from any cause not being awarded the Sailing Committee shall have power to decide when such cup or prize shall be competed for, and if advisable to change the sailing course thereof, or whether such prize shall revert to the Club.

The Sailing Committee shall appoint a measurer or measurers, whose duty shall be to measure the hull and sails of each boat enrolled in the Club. The measurer shall fill out the Enrollment Form for each boat applying for registration, and sign the same as evidence that the boat and sails are within the prescribed limits.

Membership

The membership of this Club shall be open to any person who shall make application through any Officer or Member of the Club, and pay the prescribed annual fee.

Any member found guilty of breaking the rules and regulations of the Club, or of conduct unbecoming a gentleman, may be suspended at the discretion of the meeting, of which the suspended member shall be notified by the Secretary in writing, when the matter shall be taken up, both sides shall be heard, and the case decided by the majority vote of the members present.

BYE-LAWS

Meetings

Meetings may be called at any time by the Commodore, as provided for in the Constitution.

Twelve members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

The Secretary shall, as far as possible, notify members of the Club of every special, regular and adjourned meeting of the club.

Order of Business

The Commodore, or in his absence, the officer of highest rank present, shall take the Chair and call the meeting to order.

The members being seated, the Secretary shall call the roll. A quorum being present the order of business shall be as follows:

Reading of the Minutes of last meeting which shall stand approved if not objected to.

Reading of Communications.

Collection of dues.

Report of Sec'y-Treasurer.

Reports of Committees.

Election of Officers.

Miscellaneous Business.

Adjournment.

Dues

The annual subscription shall be two dollars, payable on the first day of May in each year.

No member in arrears shall be eligible to any office, nor may his vote be accepted on any election question.
