COAL SITUATION (Continued from page one) coal, and it is estimated that through these measures more than 100,000 tons have been saved. To achieve the purpose of the program a national conservation program will be launched, with the object of saving at least 20 per cent of the coal which was burned last year. "This means," said Mr. Howe, "that if you burned five tons last year we will expect you to burn four tons this year." There are several ways in which this can be done. Among them are the improvement of insulation, the cleaning of pipes and furnaces, and better-fitting windows and doors, especially storm sashes. The Minister said the government will ask owners of commercial buildings and industrial plants to appoint special coal wardens whose duty it will be to see that every possible conservation measure is taken.

Stellarton Seeks To Relieve Doctors From Camp Duties STELLARTON, N.S., Aug. 9.—(CP)—Military authorities will be asked to relieve three of the doctors from this district from their duties at the reserve army camp in Charlottetown so they may return to their practice. Dr. J. A. Garson of Halifax, chairman of the divisional advisory committee, advised united mine-workers of this area. This action is being taken by the Canadian medical procurement and assignment board to relieve the medical shortage here. Only one doctor at present is left in town, and miners had threatened a possible strike unless something was done to ease the situation.

FALL BACK (Continued from page one) bombs, shells and bullets on mission, virtually unchallenged. Fifteen miles inland from the north coast, American forces in a series of attacks, including a straight hit—14 miles by the winding, tortuous and heavily mined road—from the sea to drive the Nazis out of Cesaro. Armor-supported British troops mopping up the south slopes of the mountain range in the vicinity of San Maria Di Licodia, high up on the volcanic cone. Italian army columns captured the German positions at Cesaro, in a nine-mile drive along the east coast from Catania and pushed on to the Sicilian coast. The Allies moved ever closer to Messina. Sicily is 42 miles from that escape port, Cesaro is 48 miles and San Agata is 50. Fighting began in the area of the amphibious American forces which landed Saturday night on Atalaia at Torrenova, three miles east of Cesaro. The American forces landed seven Axis fighter-bombers over San Agata to account for the important air bases reported destroyed in air combats yesterday. U.S. fleet units provided escort for the sea movement. The American planes smothered by round-the-clock bombings. Allied air observers said Randazzo was now half-buried in ruins. Messina Pulverized The Messina escape hatch was pulverized by R.A.F. Wellingtons which maintained a small all night attack against this port, its road and bridges for an unreasonable time. Comments on Captured Red Cross Supplies TORONTO, Aug. 9.—(CP)—Mr. Justice P.E. Gordon chairman of the National Executive Committee, in a statement released today, said that Canadian Red Cross medical supplies captured from the Italians in Sicily may have been seized from the field hospital services attached to the British 8th Army during the Libyan campaign. He was commenting on a news dispatch received from Allied headquarters in North Africa Saturday which said Canadian Red Cross pillow-slips and bed sheets were among supplies captured in Sicily. A supposition that the captured supplies may have been taken from Canadian prisoners of war in enemy hands or seized from the people of suffering Greece was discounted by the chairman.
