

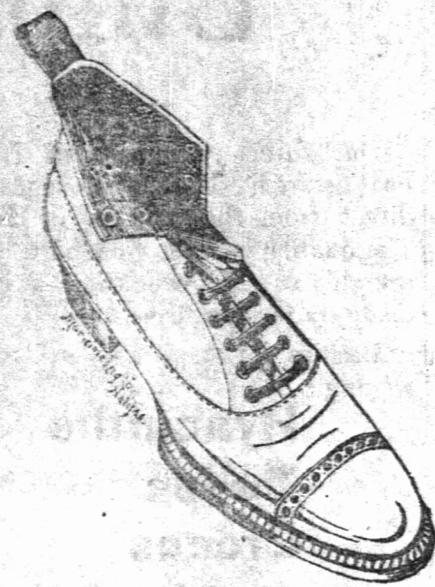

FASTER MAIL SERVICE. There has been great dissatisfaction since the change in the time of the mails brought about by the action of the Steam Navigation Company, in leaving Point du Chene before the arrival of the C. P. R. and I. C. R. mails from the west. The council of the Board of Trade have had the matter in hand for some days and have had communication with Sir Louis Davies in regard to providing a remedy. The feeling of the council is that the summer arrangement ought to be continued for weeks yet to come. They feel that if the Steam Navigation Company cannot give the service demanded by the public other arrangements must be made by which the mails will be carried across the Straits in a small steamer. Or, the mails from the west might be carried to Pictou and the time of the Princess changed so as to leave that port on the arrival of the mails there, or early the following morning.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Owing to the storm of yesterday the telegraph lines are down in New Brunswick and we are without our usual special despatches from the outside world this morning.

In Paris compressed air is fast displacing both steam and electricity as a motive power. It has been largely applied to operating street cars and many other uses. French engineers confidently predict that it will come into universal use as the most convenient, cleanly, easily divisible and useful of all the motive agencies so far discovered.

The French Mediterranean fleet has been engaged at target practice of late and made such fine shooting that it has attracted a great deal of attention in England. It was in fact better than the results of recent practice by many British ships. In the days of Nelson there was much better gunnery on the British than on the French side and this was one potent factor in securing the victories he achieved. This superiority it appears no longer exists in any such measure as at that time. British journals are calling attention to the necessity of much more target practice for the navy than has hitherto been the rule, in order to secure that accuracy of fire on which success in battle most largely depends.

PRaise FOR ISLAND HOGS. Owned by Mr. J. W. Callbeck, Augustine Cove.

It may not be generally known that at the St. John and Halifax exhibitions Mr. J. W. Callbeck, Augustine Cove, won with his Yorkshire hogs eleven first prizes, six seconds and two thirds, or nineteen prizes in all, and this in the face of keen competition. Mr. Callbeck has since disposed of 14 hogs, two of which went to the Dominion Government Experimental farm at Nappan, N. S. Speaking of his exhibit at Halifax, the Co-operative Farmer, published at Nappan, N. S., says: J. W. Callbeck, Augustine Cove, P. E. I., shows the same pigs here as in St. John, of which brief mention was made in our last issue. His boar, 'Oak Lodge Mais,' was wrongly described as being four years old. He is only two years old and is a splendid developed pig. He was imported when two months old from J. E. Brethour, Burford, Ontario, and has since a great deal of excellent stock. His three boars under one year took three prizes in St. John and first and second here.

His four-year-old sow has given her owner 97 healthy pigs and has taken four first prizes. She was also imported from Brethour. She is now suckling a fine litter of pigs. She is a typical York of her at stance. His two-year-old sow, 'White Rose 3rd of Oak Lodge,' also imported from Brethour, was first in Toronto in her class last year and is also suckling a litter. She raised 12 pigs last spring and 14 this fall, proving her productive capacity.

His pair of sows under one year, out of 'White Rose,' are gems in their line. He is breeding these and also another pair. One of the latter pair Mr. J. C. Snell says cannot be beaten in her class in Canada. She is an almost ideal bacon pig, fine toned and of great length and substance. Her name is 'Minnie of Brookside,' and we can expect to hear from her in future competitions.

Out of the same litter as the sows first mentioned is a boar, 'Brookside Mars,' which is a splendid type of Yorkshire. He took first in his class here as well as in St. John.

The Farmers' Advocate speaking of the same exhibit adds the following:—Yorkshires were shown by J. E. Page & Sons, Wm. Mul'een, Wm. Young, M. H. Parlee, and J. W. Callbeck, Augustine Cove, P. E. I., the latter making a specially fine display of high-class stock, well up to the standard of the best of the breed, and brought out in the pick of condition.

MANITOBA WHEAT CROP.

Estimates at 31,500,000, including the Territories.

MONTREAL, Oct. 24.—Mr. Meighen, president of the Lake of the Woods Milling Company, gave a 'Witnes' report on his review this morning in reference to the Manitoba wheat crop. Mr. Meighen first declined to give an opinion as he mentioned there has been so much said about the Manitoba crop that he really thought people were tired of hearing so many different reports. 'However,' he said, 'we think we are in a position to size up the Manitoba crop pretty accurately. We believe we have the largest number of elevators in Manitoba owned by any milling company or private individual and are well posted, not only in reference to Manitoba, but the Territories, and we are somewhat astonished at some of the reports that are given out in reference to this year's crop. We estimate at 31,500,000 bushels. Deduct from this 4,500,000 for seed and home consumption, leaving a surplus for export of 27,000,000 bushels.

Now, as to the quality, what is your opinion? 'We are under the impression that there will not be over twenty per cent. No. 1 hard.'

'As to the damage, do you consider it serious? 'We think it is.'

'Is there much of the wheat in stock yet? 'Yes, a very large quantity. However, I may say that we believe the wheat in stock is in better condition than some of the wheat that has been stacked.'

'What quantity do you think was thrashed before any damage was sustained? 'Certainly not over eight million bushels.'

'What price are you paying in Manitoba for No. 1 hard? 'We'll, the price we paid to farmers at country points on Saturday, Oct. 22, for No. 1 hard was sixty-two to sixty-three cents. Our Winnipeg office wires us the price paid at Neche, on the American side of the line, the same day, was fifty-six to fifty-eight cents. From this apparently the Manitoba farmer is receiving a higher price than his neighbor to the south, though this is nothing new.'

'Then the estimate of a crop of 42,000,000 bushels is much beyond your ideas? 'Certain,ly, we take no stock whatever in any such estimates, and we are satisfied results later on will prove the correctness of our opinion. We are under the impression that a number of the estimates of the Manitoba wheat crop are similar to the estimated wheat crop of the world, much over-estimated.'

'What is your estimate of the damage to the wheat crop? 'We estimate it at twenty per cent. This is caused by weather conditions.'
