### PROHIBITION ENFORCEMENT.

The Guardian as the advocate of Prohibition long years before the law was placed on our statute book and as a promoter of its extension to the entire Province, cannot now be indifferent to the manner of its enforcement.

We do not forget the debt of gratitude the people owe to the Government that prepared the measure with so much care that it has stood all constitutional tests to which it has been so far subjected. Nor do we forget the courage which faced the possible reaction in public opinion. In a nearby Province such a reaction against a Prohibitory Law had once swept away not only the law but the Government of the day as well. These risks were courageously taken by the Government and the Legislature of 1900 when by general agreement they passed the present law.

There has been no such reaction in Prince Edward Island on this question. The people of the Province are today more unanimous in favor of the principle of the law than they were seven years ago, but that was something that could not be known when the law was enacted. Both the Government and Legislature took considerable risks that were very apparent, and they have their reward. We wish also to place again on record the public appreciation of the fact that Premier Peters, even more than his predecessors in office, lent his support to the law, by appointing as General Prosecutor the man selected by the temperance leaders, and who still enjoys the full confidence of the temperance community as the best man for that difficult and responsible position.

We also desire to express our own and the public appreciation of the work of the Attorney General recently in the courts in fighting the legal battle for the law in the appeal cases that have arisen. We do not believe that in taking this course, which we place to his credit, he was actuated so much by a desire for popularity as from a sense of duty; none the less this line of action is today not only the popular one, but constitutes more than any other the strength of the Government in the moral and order-loving portion of the community. The Guardian is often compelled to be censorious, but we sincerely desire to give credit where credit is due, even if in the same article we may find it necessary to speak with some severity of failures in other respects.

The present situation with regard to the enforcement of the law is by no means free from undesirable features. There has been and is great laxity in the enforcement of penalties, notably in the outlying counties. Why are not the fines collected and official returns made and published of the moneys received by the Stipendiaries? This feature of the case must be looked to, and we shall have more to say of it hereafter. We print today a communication from responsible men calling attention to the failures in this regard in West Prince. And we cannot close without expressing our strong sense of what we conceive to be the misuse of Executive clemency in the case of the release of Frank Collins from jail when but little more than one fourth of his four months sentence had expired.

We believe that His Honor the Lieutenant Governor in this case was misled by representations made and yielded too easily to the kindness of his own nature. The same impulse acting on like representations would make a general jail

### RIVER TOWNS AND SEWAGE.

A question of more than passing interest was decided by the Government, of New Brunswick the other day. The city of Fredericton, capital of the Province, has been ordered by the Provincial Board of Health to dispose of its sewage otherwise than by turning it into the river St. John as has been done from time immemorial. The city appealed to the Provincial Government and that body, which seems to be the court of last resort in such cases, dismissed the appeal and sustained the decision of the Board of Health.

The reason for this action is obvious enough. Fredericton, like scores of cities and towns situated on the banks of rivers, obtains its water supply from the river above the city and discharges all its filth into the river below the city. This was a very convenient arrangement for Fredericton, but a most nauseating and dangerous condition for the people living farther down the stream. Not only the filth but the germs of infectious diseases was turned into the river. And what Fredericton has been doing 85 miles above St. John, Woodstock, a town of 8,000 people had been doing 60 miles above Fredericton.

The like conditions formerly prevailed on the river Ottawa. The federal capital takes its entire water supply from the river of the same name. Higher up stream are the towns of Aylmer, Pembroke and other towns and villages which drained their filth into the stream. And Ottawa was doing precisely what Fredericton was doing, drinking from the waters above its own site and pouring out its filth below. Before the danger became known these conditions passed unchallenged, but sanitary science and experience have demonstrated the peril that is involved.

Cities on the great lakes in many cases derive their water supply from the same great receptacle into which their sewage is discharged. Toronto, after successive epidemics of typhoid and diphtheria from this cause, has tunneled through the island that shelters its harbor and at great cost extended the intake for its water supply far out into Lake Ontario, while its sewage is discharged inshore. The remedy is at best partial and unsatisfactory. Chicago long discharged its sewage into Lake Michigan and drew its water supply by an intake extended some miles further from shore. At length the great city was compelled to grapple

with the problem and spent some thirty five millions on a drainage canal to carry its sewage away to the Mississippi instead of into the lake.
