### CURE FOR THE TOBACCO HABIT

1. The first step in giving up tobacco is to give it up; do not try to taper off. All the will power and determination must be mobilized for action. The WILL placed determinedly on God's side becomes omnipotent, thus making the impossible, possible.
2. Keep away from smokers and a tobacco laden atmosphere. If possible, for about three weeks.
3. After each meal for one week rinse out the mouth with a three-fourths of one per cent. solution of silver nitrate. This creates a distaste for tobacco smoke and will also relieve throat irritation.
4. Purchase five cents worth of gentian root (camomile, camomile blossoms) and chew it during the day when there is a desire to smoke.
5. To assist in eliminating the poison, take a dose composed of half a teaspoon of Rochelle salts and cream of tartar each morning before breakfast for one week.
6. If possible take a Turkish Bath or a good sweat bath of some kind twice during the first two weeks.
7. Drink water, orange juice or grapefruit juice freely. When tempted, reach for an orange instead of a cigarette.

### DRINKING DRIVERS SCORED BY DR. L. JOCLYN ROGERS

Forty-five per cent of all major automobile accidents involve either a drunk driver or a drunken pedestrian. Dr. L. Joclyn Rogers, head of the Department of Analytical Chemistry at the University of Toronto and consultant to the Attorney General of Ontario, declared at a Rotary Club luncheon in January at the Windsor Hotel.

He said that a stern view should be taken of people who drive while intoxicated and he assailed the theory that people who try to dissuade others from driving while under the influence of alcohol are interfering with public liberty.

"There is no liberty for the dead and little freedom for the maimed," Dr. Rogers continued, "yet we often selfishly demand the right to drink and drive with no thought that a little restraint on our part may mean life and ability to enjoy living to others."

Dr. Rogers paid tribute to the Quebec department of criminal investigation, which was founded by the late Dr. W. Derome, "the present director, Dr. Rosario Ferrantine, and his assistant, Dr. J. M. Roussel, are doing work which is second to none in the Dominion."
