The following letter received by Miss Mary Devine, Hunter River from her son, Ernest Devine, 145 St. Witley Camp.

145th St. Witley Camp, Signalling Section, Dec. 26th, 1916.

Dear Sister—Well, May I have been expecting a letter from you for some time. I was almost sure I would see one when I came back from pass but nothing doing. I had a dandy time on the pass. You should see Edinburgh, Scotland. It is the nicest place I have seen yet in all my travels. The people are so nice, they could not do enough for a Canadian soldier. They meet you on the street and take you to their house and give you supper. We were into some very ancient places, the old Palace we used to read about in school, such as Edinburgh Castle, Alton House, the Bobbie Burns' Monument, and a lot more places. I was up into Scots Monument. It is some ornament. I shall describe it to you.

It is 200 ft. 6 ins. high, 187 feet top gallery. I was up to the gallery and from there you can see the whole city. There are 187 steps in it so you see it is a nice walk to the top of it. I was almost done out when I got there. Foundation Stone was laid in 1849. Assessed in October 1844, cost £15,650 or \$76,800 of our money. It was also into a Museum there and I think they have every thing in the world, all kinds of animals, fish and men; also the Castle. I was in Queen Mary's room, also her bed room and saw all the old weapons they used to use some years ago and they are some
