E. A. McEachern of the Montague Baptist Church followed with an earnest and eloquent address, in which he eulogized the late King and dwelt on our duty to “honor the King.” Rev. F. A. Wightman of the Montague Methodist Church spoke in his usual and eulogistic terms of the late lamented King-Emperor. Rev. David Wright of the Montague Presbyterian Church followed with a brief but earnest address on the great loss the Empire sustained in the death of our noble King. About one thousand persons were present, the service closing at 9:15 p. m. with the enthusiastic singing by the immense congregation of “God Save the King.”—L.L.

DECISION APPEALED.

Decision has been handed down at Toronto by the court of appeals of the Methodist church in Canada that the interim committee of the New Brunswick and P. E. Island Conference should be upheld in its action as to Rev. T. J. Deinstadt, of St. John, in June last, but condemned so thoroughly the principle which allowed the committee such extensive powers in the affairs of the church that, it is said, no interim committee will be able again to adjust an affair of such controversial importance. This, it is said, will be a certainty after the meeting of the General Conference, the quadrennial session of which will be held at Vancouver in August of the present year. It is pointed out, however, that Rev. Mr. Deinstadt's appeal will result in the greatest revolution in church law which has developed in any Canadian church during the past few years. Rev. Mr. Deinstadt is well known in this province and the case thus settled, has excited a good deal of local interest.

FUNERAL OF L. R. McLAREN.

MONCTON, N. B., May 19—As an evidence of the esteem in which the late Lawrence R. McLaren who was drowned at Murray River, P. E. I., on February 8th, and whose body was found Friday afternoon, last, a large number of representative citizens attended his funeral, which was held from his late residence on Steadman street Thursday afternoon. A very impressive funeral service was conducted at the house by Rev. T. MacOdrum, pastor of St. John's Presbyterian Church. Rev. Mr. MacOdrum, also conducted the service at the grave. The hymns rendered were: “Jesus Lover of My Soul,” “Lead Kindly Light,” and “Ninety and Nine.” The attendance at the funeral was very large, a large number of friends of deceased gathered at the house, while many teams followed the remains to their last resting place in Elmwood cemetery. There were beautiful floral tributes from the near relatives of the deceased. It was by special request

that friends did not send flowers. The pall-bearers were the three brothers—Charles R. McLaren, W. A. McLaren, and D. P. McLaren, A. M. McLellan, A. E. Holstead and Alexander Leslie.

INSTRUCTIONS TO SCHOOL CHILDREN

Planting Trees in Competition For Warburton-Prowse Prize.

1st.—All trees to be as near as possible of even size, not exceeding three (3) inches in circumference, that avenues may show at all times trees of similar size.

2nd.—One kind of tree only to be planted in each competition.

3rd.—The distance from the road to be such to ensure that the roots will not be cut in road-making.

4th.—Ten (10) trees to be planted five (5) on each side of the road, thirty (30) feet apart.

5th.—Maples, elms, birches, white or red, limes or horsechestnuts alone allowed.

6th.—To ensure life and rapid growth select trees well rooted with plenty of fibrous roots.

7th.—Plant in hole large enough to extend beyond roots, not over one foot in depth, and cover with good top soil, with slight mixture of well-rotted manure.

8th.—Pound soil well, hard after planting.

9th.—Through the summer keep top soil loose, and not grass grown.

10th.—Cut back all trees to even height of six (6) feet, no matter how

many branches you cut. (my tallest trees were grown from roots only.)

11th.—With the consent of the Commissioner or Supervisor, remove all trees which will interfere with light and air to yours.

12th.—Notify Secretary of Board when trees are in, and later if things go well with you, that you are in competition.

I will personally inspect, if possible and help along this good work with two consolation prizes of \$5.00 and \$3.00 each.
