SENATORS CONFER WITH RAILROADS

President Mitchell Advised to Call Out Canadian Miners

SCHOOLS WITHOUT COAL

The Federal Government of the United States Asked to Pro- ceed Against the Miners.

CANADIAN MINERS CALLED OUT.

DENVER, Oct. 10.—(Special)—The Western Federation Miners have telegraphed to President Mitchell advising him to call out all the soft coal miners in Canada and the United States.

SCHOOLS ARE CLOSED.

SCHENECTADY, Oct. 10.—(Special)—The schools are closed as the authorities have no coal for them.

MOVEMENT IN COAL MATTERS.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 10.—(Special)—Next week the coal miners along the Lake Erie Alliance and Reading Railroad will be opened to ship coal. The road intends to open seventy thousand acres of coal lands.

SOME SENATORS CONFER.

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—(Special)—Senators Quay, Platte and Penrose, and Governor Odell met Chairman Thomas of the Erie Railroad and President Baer of Reading this afternoon.

TO PROCEED AGAINST MINERS.

David Wilcox, the Vice President of D. A. and S. Railroad on behalf of the owners' committee that met in Cleveland has sent President Roosevelt a letter demanding that the Federal Government proceed against the miners' organization as a conspiracy to prevent interstate commerce.

AWFUL TRAGEDY.

HALIFAX, Oct. 10.—(Special)—While crazed from overwork on a new invention Chas. Cawley aged seventeen of Home-stead killed his mother and sister and fatally injured four other children with an axe.

DANCE ENDS FATALLY.

NORTH SYDNEY, Oct. 10.—(Special)—At a colored dance James Brooks from Georgia and G. S. Scott from Alabama fought and both drew their revolvers, Scott died from his wounds and Brooks was injured but not seriously. Scott was unmarried, Brooks has a wife and family who were expected shortly from Georgia.

NORTH SYDNEY, Oct. 10.—(Special)—Alex Morason of Glace Bay and Anderson a Swede of Port Morien were both killed by fall of coal. Both are single men.

FINDS HIS WIFE DEAD.

HALIFAX, Oct. 10.—(Special)—Thomas Brown a farmer of Folly Village found his wife lying dead in the hall with a bad wound on her head. It is believed that she fell down stairs.

ALMOST A DROWNING FATALITY

Alex McLeod of West River Narrowly Escapes

IN WATER OVER AN HOUR

Boat Upset at Three Tides Yester- day Afternoon—His Calls for Help Attract Assistance.

A sad drowning accident at the Three Tides off Victoria Park was averted yesterday afternoon only by the presence of mind and forethought of John McQuillan caretaker of the park and Joseph Jackson of Brighton Brewery who barely succeeded in rescuing the unfortunate man ere he succumbed by exhaustion and sank to a watery grave.

About three o'clock in the afternoon John McQuillan while working near the tennis grounds heard shouts as of a man in dire distress proceeding from the south—the direction of the river. He hastened to the shore and saw at the Three Tides an upturned boat and a man struggling in the water. No boat was at hand and there appeared no means of rescue. After a hasty deliberation Mr. McQuillan hailed a passing team and drove to Brighton Brewery where a boat was procured and with the assistance of Jackson was launched near the bathing house. The wind was blowing a gale and the tide was running strong but notwithstanding that the boat was without rowlocks the drowning man was reached and brought to shore.

The occupant of the boat was Alexander McLeod of West River who had brought oysters to the City in the morning and was returning to his home. He had been in the water for over an hour and when rescued was in a beumbed condition and in a short time more would have had to let go the boat.

His explanation of the accident was that while reading under a tree and resting on the bank he thought that the boat would carry more. He ran out this forecast but this proved to much, while going forward to loosen the stays when off the mouth of the North River a squall struck the boat and she was upset. He managed to obtain a hold on the edge and remained in that position till rescued. McLeod was taken to the City and in several hours was apparently none the worse of his experience. The boat was brought into the wharf later in the afternoon by some friends.

The large and valuable list of presents testified to the high esteem in which the bride is held. Among the rest was a bible and hymn book presented by the trustees of the church, it being the first marriage ceremony performed in the new church. Mr. and Mrs. Heaney will reside at Clinton where Mr. Heaney has just completed one of the most beautiful residences in that section of the country. All join in extending congratulations.

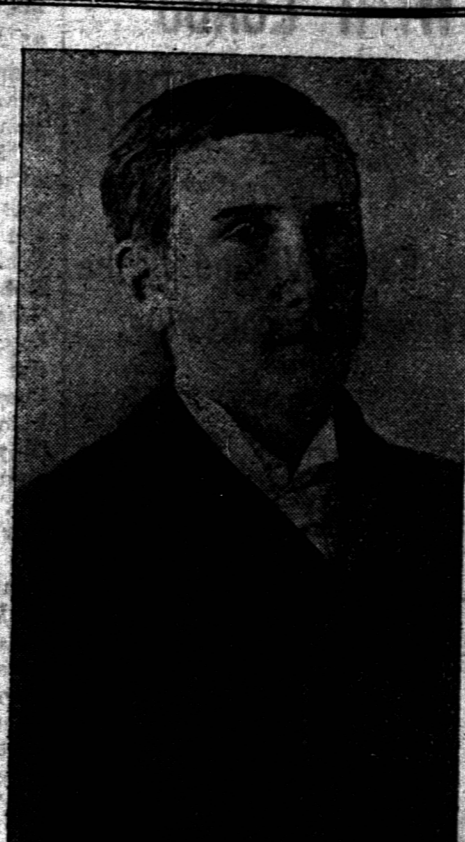

REGULAR QUARTERLY MEETING

Board of Trade Held Last Evening

MATTERS OF IMPORTANCE

Vote of Thanks to Government— Action in Insurance and Rail- way Station Matters.

The adjourned quarterly meeting of the Board of Trade was held last night. President Auld occupied the chair with whom were a goodly number of members. Minutes of past quarterly meetings were read and approved.

W. B. Robertson, Dr. F. P. Kelly, Mayor Warburton, J. A. Matheson, D. Seburman and P. S. Brown, were proposed for members.

A communication was read from the Maritime Board of Trade re placing fire insurance with non-tariff Companies. Considerable discussion took place on the high rates and the general opinion was that it was more a matter of protection than of rates. The matter was left with the Council to act.

Horace Hazard gave a verbal report of the Maritime Board meeting in Sydney. He was asked to prepare a paper on the questions discussed which he promised to do.

A resolution, thanking Premier Peters and his Government for their prompt response to the request for a grant to the Exhibition, was passed unanimously.

The President, Vice President and Mr. Matheson were appointed a committee to confer with the Minister of Railways or his representative regarding the site for the new station.

After desultory discussion the Board adjourned.
