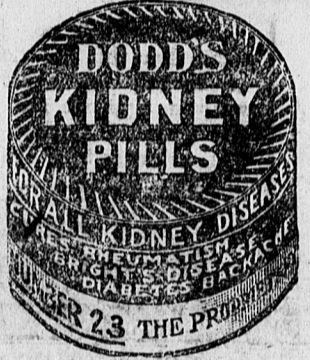

Horne was the auctioneer.

Hogs are being marketed in considerably large quantities throughout the country at the present time. With a number of farmers potatoes a success and they are inclined to kill their hogs rather than feed on "The packers complain that too many hogs are being offered just now as weather is too mild to handle them to advantage.

The Montreal Star says:—Local fish dealers report the trade as fairly good, with prices well for this reason of the year. Oysters, especially the Malpeque variety, are in good demand, and prices hold very strong. Many dealers say the trade in this line is the best for many years. The Malpeque fancy oyster are quoted from \$10 to \$13 per barrel.

L. B. McMillan, of Charlottetown, Secretary of the M. P. A. A. N. S., arrived in this city this afternoon and will proceed by Maritime Express to Toronto where on Saturday an annual meeting of the C. A. A. U. is to be held. Regarding hockey prospects on the Island, Mr. McMillan said the same old league would be on, but having lost some five or six of their best men the standard of play may be the poorer. The usual batch of post-baseball and hockey applications for reinstatement are beginning to find their way across the Straits, he says, but the majority look pretty black for the amateur fold.—Moncton Transcript.

The C. G. S. Aberdeen, Capt. Blois, arrived in port yesterday from the western shores bringing in the remainder of the buoys from that section. Today she will bring in the last two now remaining, Fitzroy Rock and Pt. Prim buoys. This afternoon she will remove the big buoys on the wharf where they are being cleaned by six men, an annual operation which will not be completed for some days. She will likely go to Halifax on Monday morning. A Halifax exchange says she will be laid up for repairs and the installation of new boilers on her return to Halifax and also says there is a report that she will be withdrawn from the light and buoy service and used as a coal carrying in connection with the Navy and Marine and Fisheries service.

### FOOTBALL RECEIPTS AT YALE ARE \$70,000.

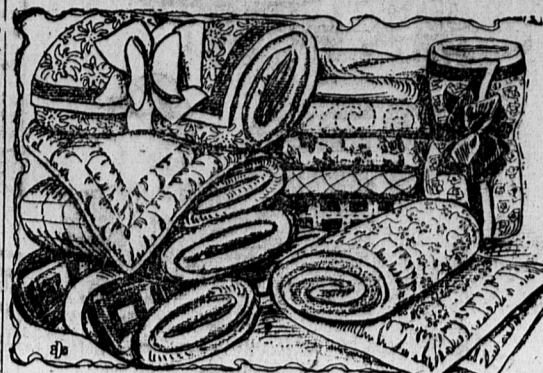
NEW HAVEN, Conn., Nov. 25.—Yale's football receipts will probably prove about \$70,000 this year. This is about \$3000 less than years when Yale played Harvard in Cambridge. Yale fills her stands at home, no matter whether Harvard or Princeton plays her, but when Yale's other big game is with Princeton at Princeton, there are only 29,000 people present, while there are 30,000 people at the game Yale plays biennially in Cambridge. This is, then, an off year in Yale football receipts, although the attendance at the Vanderbilt game was larger than ever before, and that at the Vanderbilt and Colgate matches showed a slight increase. The main items in the receipts will be about as follows:—Harvard game, \$34,000; Princeton game, \$29,000; Brown game, \$5,000; Vanderbilt game, \$1500; Colgate game, \$1500. The football association will not announce the exact receipts for several weeks.

ESTIL BOY AND DESSIE PATCHEN GO TO THE AUCTION. FREDERICKTON, Nov. 25.—Estil Boy, (2.16), and Dessie Patchen (2.13), both star performers on the maritime circuit in the Springton stables several years ago, are to be sold at the Old Glory Horse sale in Madison Square Gardens, New York, this week.
