47 Million Have Right To Ballot

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2—Forty-seven million persons have qualified to vote in the United States general elections next Tuesday, exceeding by four and a half million the record-shattering registration of 1928.

A state by state survey by the Associated Press shows exactly 49,985,230 persons eligible to participate in the 1932 presidential balloting. This compares with a national registration of 42,387,254 for the Hoover-Smith contest four years ago and is an increase of

10,166,561 over the actual vote cast in that peak year of ballot-marking.

Criers Have Their Inning

(Canadian Press)
LONDON, Nov. 2—A motor coach following "Oyez!" from two giant loud-speakers mounted on the roof shattered the stillness of many country hamlets in the Home Counties. As the coach loltered for a few minutes beside placid villages greens the voice shouted tidings with the concentrated force of a battalion of town criers. "Oyez Oyez!" it yelled to groups of mystified villagers. Then it dispelled their bewilderment by explaining that it was merely a modern robot—a radio town crier, announcing the approach in half an hour's time of the radio trade convoy, comprising 100 decorated and illuminated vans bound for the Northern National Radio Exhibition at Manchester.

Its tidings imparted to each town and village en route, the robot town crier moved on, and true to the promise of the hundred-horsepower voice, the procession of vans, each advertising some wireless equipment, arrived half an hour later. Prominent in the procession was J. A. Mollison's Hear, Content, the aeroplane in which he flew the Atlantic mounted on two lorries. Arrangements had been made for the convoy to be given civic receptions by the lord mayors and mayors of five towns and cities on the way. There were police preparations for dealing with the procession and A. A. patrols escorted the convoy throughout the journey.

New Robinson Crusoe Found

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NO PREFERENCES FOR GOODS RECONSIGED VIA UNITED STATES

British Government's Position Regarding Shipment Of Canadian Goods Via Foreign Ports Outlined In British Commons, By Government Spokesman — Amendment Is Defeated—A Matter Of Policy.

LONDON, Nov. 2—Canadian wheat stored in United States elevators and from there consigned to the United Kingdom will not be entitled to preferences decided at the Imperial Conference to Canadian wheat. This announcement was made in the House of Commons today by L. Hore-Belisha, a government spokesman.

Amendment Defeated
An amendment, moved by Sir J. Sandeman Allen, member of the Union Government, asking that grain consigned from an American port and certified by the Canadian government officer to have been grown in Canada should be entitled to the preference was defeated 247 to 55. The government declined to accept the amendment.

Mr. Hore-Belisha said the government had two reasons for refusing the amendment, firstly because the customs procedure would make it extremely difficult to identify the wheat and secondly, on the grounds of policy.

A Matter of Policy
It has always been a matter of policy, declared Mr. Hore-Belisha, to insist that goods which were to enjoy the preference must not only be grown in the empire but must

be consigned from an empire country. The government spokesman quoted a statement of Premier R. B. Bennett, in the Canadian House of Commons on Oct. 26, as saying that "preferences would not be available to goods sent from Canada to the United States and re-consigned there." Mr. Hore-Belisha considered that an accurate outline of the position. "It is our purpose to encourage the storage of wheat either in Canada, which is to obtain the preference, or in the United Kingdom where we may obtain an advantage of the storage and warehouse dues," added Mr. Hore-Belisha.

There was still \$200 worth of liquor missing.

Planes Make Record Trips

ADELAIDE, Australia, Nov. 2—Once again the British monoplane air liners which fly regularly with mails and passengers between Perth and Adelaide have set new speed records for the journey. In May one of these machines flew the 1,450 miles separating the two Australian cities in 10 hours. Recently in nine hours and 40 minutes, the journey was completed making the new record average speed for the run no less than 150 miles an hour.
