GENERAL FRENCH.

General French succeeds to the command of the first army corps of which Gen. Buller has been relieved. Gen. French is still in South Africa, and may not return till the war is over. The English press is unanimously in favor of his promotion. Since the Boer war began Gen. French has shown himself alert, active and resourceful. No one of the South African commanders has been more extensively engaged, or has been so uniformly successful. He has not made mistakes.

As the Montreal Herald puts it "There can be but one opinion of the appointment of General French to replace his old chief. General French has absolutely the best reputation made in this war. He was successful about Colesburg. He relieved Kimberly. He led the cavalry from one success to another on the northward sweep. He raided the Transvaal east and west, he raided the Orange State, he chased the raiders in Cape Colony, and nowhere did he meet with a reverse. Kitchener blundered at Paardeberg, Lord Roberts proclaimed the war at an end a year ago. French has not one error of judgement recorded against him. Instead, he has been honored, alone of British generals, by the praise of the Boer leaders. If ever a man fairly won his spurs, General French has won his."

In General Buller's downfall as usual there was a woman in the case. It was Ladysmith. The St. John Telephone Company has applied to the City Council for permission to place its wires underground along the principal streets and squares.

The decision of Mr. Justice Hodgson to be given at Georgetown on Thursday next will determine, among other things, whether Mr. McKinnon shall be awarded the seat, or whether it shall be declared vacant. Last year Canada exported to Great Britain 162,516 cwt. of butter, against 141,948 cwt. exported thither by the United States. Canada however supplied but a small part of the British imports of butter the total of which was 3,599,364 cwt. Denmark alone supplied 1,536,393 cwt. or over nine times as much as Canada. And the Australian colonies supplied more than twice as much butter as Canada. France, Holland and Sweden in the order named were the next largest sources of supply.

A cable letter tells that Baden Powell since his return to England goes about London practically unnoticed, although his defence of Mafeking had made him for the time the most popular man in England since the time of Waterloo. The correspondent proceeds: "If he had come home a year ago he would have been mobbed and hugged and feted by delirious crowds of admirers. Baden-Powellism was a fever an epidemic. It has completely burnt itself out, and not only is the gallant general a mere memory with the public, but he has also been made to taste the bitterness of official and royal displeasure. The War Office was not overjoyed at what they called his theatrical defence of Mafeking. Public opinion, however, forced them into making him a major-general. Then the public, ever eager to load its favorites with honor and glory, looked to the Queen to confer upon him the well deserved knighthood, but it did not come. But the reason of it was that Baden-Powell had usurped a royal prerogative in having substituted his portrait on the Mafeking siege stamps for that of the Sovereign. The late Queen never forgave him this presumption; and so when B. P. came home the other day and called, naturally enough, at Marlborough House to pay his respects to the King, the hero of Mafeking was 'turned away.'"

In the year ended with July last Canada exported to the United Kingdom 1,522,440 cwt. of cheese, against 548,837 cwt. sent thither from the United States. The total of cheese imported from all countries during the year was 2,578,566 cwt. of which considerably more than one half came from Canada.

It is announced that King Edward has set himself against Sunday entertainments of every sort, and recently declined to leave Scotland for London on Sunday although expected to do so on account of business of some urgency. The example of the King in this respect will increase the respect of the millions of his subjects who still value the day of rest and worship.

There is a storm among the negro-haters of the South because President Roosevelt recently had Mr. Booker Washington, a colored gentleman at dinner with him at the White House. Among the objectors are many southern Republicans who think the action of the President is prejudicial to the party interests. The President is showing independence and taking a way of his own, which is approved by the old-fashioned Republicans of the days of Lincoln. Booker Washington is a clever, well educated negro who is also principal of a college. He is admitted to be the foremost representative of his race in the republic, where the colored people make up about one eighth of the total population.
