**Mrs Malcolm MacLeod Stresses Need For Bracken's Leadership**

A strong appeal was made last night to the farmers and farm women of the Province by Mrs. Malcolm MacLeod, of Lorne Valley. Her speech was part of the Progressive Conservative Party's "Why must one-third of the people of Canada be denied their fair share of the national income?"

"During the war we have produced enormous quantities of food for Britain and her allies at prices very little above the cost of production. True there have been Government subsidies and bounties which have brightened the picture somewhat, but at the same time there have been increases in the cost of farm labour, fertilizer, feeds, et cetera, which have offset the higher prices. In fact, taken into consideration the poor quality of merchandise offered us at fancy prices, we who have big families to provide for, are no better off than before and this at a time when Canada is experiencing a boom which has brought prosperity to the urban population."

"We must remove fear and want from the people of Canada, and to be still more concrete we must remove fear and want from our farmers. This is no exaggeration. We who are raising families had, even before the war, to limit our purchases to necessities, and then far too often we had to prune these necessities again. To educate our children calls for real sacrifice on all of the family. Doctors and dentist bills are magnified into major calamities, heat and water are our daily companions. Thrift is a virtue, but sometimes even a virtue can be overdone."

"With the successful termination of the war in Europe many problems will confront the newly elected parliament, but what will concern us most will be its attitude towards Agriculture. Have you read Dr. Latimer's Economic Survey of Prince Edward Island which was published about three months ago? What a truly shocking state of affairs it revealed. The average cash revenue per farm in the Province for 1941 was \$863.00 that was \$820 a month or \$82.00 a month to pay for food, clothing, school books, medical and dental care, taxes, machinery repairs, blacksmiths bills, and all too often interest on a mortgage. Do you wonder we suffer from malnutrition? The Government is buying up farms for our returning

soldiers, unless conditions are radically improved. I am afraid they will not think we are very grateful for their sacrifices.

"Why must one-third of the people of Canada be denied their fair share of the national income? Ladies between ourselves MacKenzie King's Government forfeited a policy of milk coats and flour bags and at one stage of the war we even denied us our flour bags."

Farmer Prime Minister Needed

"The solution of our difficulties is to have a farmer Premier, one who understands our problems, because he has faced them himself. John Bracken was born and grew up on a farm. He had a brilliant scholastic career and then held positions with the Department of Agriculture of Manitoba and Saskatchewan. He was president of Manitoba Agriculture College and Premier of Manitoba for twenty years, during which time his policies were so profitable to the province that when he resigned to become leader of the Progressive Conservative Party he had a following of fifty members out of a total of fifty five.

"His entire life has been devoted to Agriculture. He is a man with a mission and that mission to raise the status of the farmers of Canada to give us freedom from fear and freedom from want."

"We are fortunate indeed to have such a splendid slate of candidates offering themselves for election on June 11th. Men able in debate and of Dominion calibre, Lt. Col. Strong and Captain H. F. MacPhee are veterans of the first Great War, and Wing Commander Angus MacLean was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross with Bar for his bravery and outstanding achievements in the war in Europe which has just been brought to a successful conclusion. His colleague W. Chester S. MacLure has been a member of the Provincial Council of Commons at Ottawa — an ex-Commons at Ottawa — and experienced man who if elected will faithfully serve his constituents and the Province.

"It has been said many times that the reason we farmers are downtrodden is because we cannot organize as a body or union to demand our rights. That is true but now an opportunity is afforded us to fight with our ballots.

"Let us on June 11th vote for the Conservative candidates who if elected will support the Hon. John Bracken in his efforts to assure every Canadian of a job and a reward according to his ability. This war has shown that Canadian industry, Agriculture, Labour and resources are capable of producing a national income which if equitably distributed would enable every Canadian household to enjoy a degree of physical well-being far higher than it has yet known and largely to provide its own security.

"Let us give our farmer leader a chance to put this policy into effect."

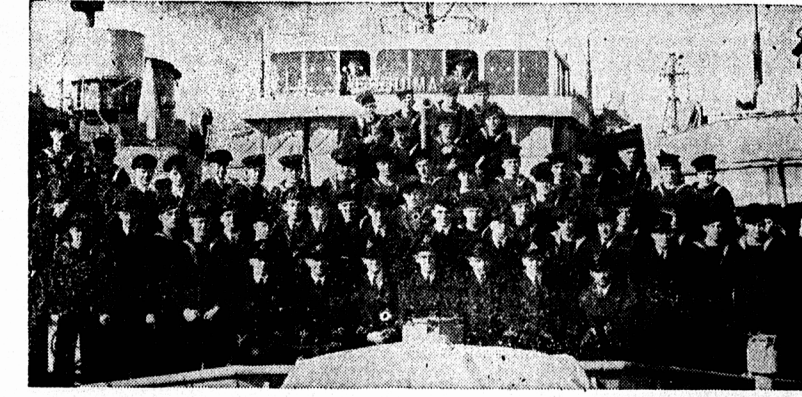

**U-BOAT Sinks Veteran Minesweeper "ESQUIMALT"**



Struck on her starboard side by a U-boat's torpedo, H. M. C. S. "Esquimalt" has been sunk while carrying out patrols in the North Atlantic. Of her crew of 70, sixteen men were killed and 28 are missing at sea. Above is a recent picture of the ship's company, and at right the ship herself. Among the survivors is her Commanding Officer, Lieut. R. MacMillan, D.S.C. and Bar, RCNVR, of Charlottetown. Following the tradition of the sea he was the last man to leave his ship. "By the time I reached the bridge, I saw that already the starboard side was so low the whaler (sea boat) was flooded. So we started to abandon ship," Lieut. MacMillan said.

He stayed until the bow was pointing high in the air and sliding towards the sea, blowing his whistle and shouting the "Abandon Ship" warning, they said. "Then he walked down the sloping side, stepped into the water and swam to a float.

Only other officer to survive, Sub. Lieut. Michael Kazakoff, RCNVR, Kansas, Sask., had perhaps the narrowest escape of all. At first in the floats the men sang and even joked. "Row, Row, Row the Boat" was a favorite song on one. "Tipperary" was done four or five times. Later they turned to "Silent Night" and other hymns. And they prayed.

The commanding officer led in singing several hymns in two of the floats which were lashed together, and led in prayers. "The men asked me to," Lieut. MacMillan said. It was several hours before an aircraft flew overhead and spotted them, the same time as H. M. C. S. Sarnia appeared over the horizon heading for them.
