AN EXPERT TALK ON FOUL BROOD.

Mr. F. E. Miller, Michigan State Apiarist, gave some valuable pointers on the detection and eradication of foul brood at a recent bee-keeping demonstration in Northumberland county. Some of Mr. Miller's remarks are given by J. M., in Family Herald and Weekly Star.
The disease of a bacterial nature, lives in the honey, and destroys the young larvae. It is very small and divides every half hour. If a little honey is contaminated it will spread very rapidly throughout the colony, and will be carried on the bodies of the bees to every colony in the apiary, and to apiaries in the vicinity. It does not destroy adult bees, and is not harmful to the human beings when eaten by them in the honey.
The first symptoms is shown by the larva losing its well-rounded, creamy appearance. It turns brown and greasy-looking, and one end drops to the bottom of the cell. It becomes darker in color and finally dries up to a scale, which loosens and is carried off by the bees. The cells are seldom capped, as they are in the case of American foul brood.
The only treatment is one of prevention. The colonies should be restocked with Italian bees, as these are much less susceptible. These may be distinguished from the black bees by their yellow color.
The bees must be shaken out into hives that have been thoroughly disinfected. These should be burned out with gasoline and all things used about the apiary should be boiled for at least forty minutes. The bees all up with the infected honey when shaken, and should be placed in the new hives with frames of half-inch foundation. In three days the honey they have held will have been consumed, and they should again be shaken into a new hive with full sheets of foundation. Italian queens should be introduced and only young, vigorous ones allowed to remain.
The quality of stock is very important and queens should be reared in the second best colonies. In week swarm. They are prevented from doing so by placing on a second super. The queen will lay eggs in all the sections and the bees will not be crowded. Those in which young queens are reared should be built up as already explained. Their colonies must then be divided in the fall.
Mr. Miller stated that the whole question of controlling European foul brood depends largely upon re-queening. He concluded by giving the Northumberland bee-keepers the advice to keep young, vigorous, and strong colonies.

ALWAYS CONSULT THE PHONE DIRECTORY.

It is surprising the large number of people in Charlottetown who, when they want to inquire about their Morning Daily Guardian or subscription, ask Central for the News phone No. 132.3, instead of 132.2, or when they want to inquire about advertising ask Central for the Subscription phone No. 132.2, or for the News Phone No. 133, instead of 132-3; or when they want the News or Editorial Department ask Central for the Subscription phone No. 132.2, or the Advertising phone No. 132.3, instead of 133, although all those departments and their respective phone numbers are plainly given in the telephone book. Some people, instead of looking at the book, even phone one what number to ask for to get another department. All this is a great waste of time on the part of the person phoning, the operator at the Central, and the clerk in the department wrongly phoned. The news staff, on an upper floor, cannot give the necessary information about either advertising or subscriptions, nor the advertising staff about subscriptions or news, nor the subscription staff about advertising or news. In other words the clerks know and can do but their own work in their own departments, and if it were otherwise they would be continually running from one department to another, up-stairs and down, mixing work, wearing themselves out and causing the greatest possible confusion. On and after 6 p. m. daily it is useless to ask for any phone numbers except 132 and 133.

Patrons who consult their phone books for the numbers they really want will greatly lessen the work of the patient Central telephone and Guardian clerks and thus help make their lives much brighter and happier.
