PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON House met at 2:30.

Hon Mr. Peters submitted the report of the Commissioner of Crown lands. It showed the amount due on the 30,257 acres unsettled for, including single interests to 31st December 1904 was \$25,770.00. The unsold land as near as can be estimated after a careful examination of the plans and Township Ledgers, amounts to 45,382 acres.

Hon Mr. Hughes in moving the House into committee of the whole on the bill respecting North River Road and Victoria Park said the bill was the same as that from which the Governor last year withheld his assent. Since then the matter has been submitted to the Minister of Justice and he did not see why the Governor for any constitutional reason withheld his assent.

Hon. Mr. Peters said the bill was unanimously passed last year and the Minister of Justice had later written him inquiring why the assent of the Governor had been withheld as he could see no reason why he should not approve of it.

The House resolved itself into committee of the whole with Mr. Agnew in the chair and the bill was reported agreed to.

The debate on the Budget was then resumed.

Hon. Mr. Cumminsley first referred to the appointment of the new Lieutenant Governor and the new speaker of the House, both young men who had rapidly earned promotion in political circles. Dealing with the case of the recent St. Peters elections and the swearing in of members at the opening of the Legislature he quoted precedents to prove that the Legislature had taken the proper course in declaring the seat vacant when there was an equality of votes between the two candidates. He spoke of the recent local election and compared the parties to two political ships of state, the one having safely returned to port while the other had been disabled and had lost some of her crew. The Conservatives as well as the Liberals had appealed to the people on the question of consolidation of the debt but when it came to a vote in the House the Opposition by their unanimous votes had opposed such a scheme. Dealing with the debt of the province he charged the Conservatives with a large portion of the amount against the Province. The Fishery Award, he had good hopes for believing, would soon be divided and this would add greatly to our revenue. He asserted that the dividing of this award would not mean that the fishermen would lose their bounties. The farmers were less heavily taxed than any other class and at the present time more than any other their burdens should be lightened. He repeated the charge that lay against the Opposition with doing everything to obstruct the measures for assistance to the country. The importation of feed has been a great benefit to the farmers of the province. With reference to the Department of Public Works he defended his administration of that department and answered charges that had previously been made by the Leader of the Opposition, especially with regard to a vote of \$90 for Hon J. H. Cumminsley, which appeared in the Public Works report and which had been paid after three years by order in council of the Government. About \$21,000 had been spent during the last four years of Conservative rule each year, with all between 18 and 60 doing statute labor, while during his administration of the past four years about \$23,000 yearly had been expended; there was no statute labor now at all, every bit of work was paid for, and the roads were infinitely better than ever before. The road system had not been criticised during last election campaign and this was evidence of good administration. The bridges were now being built of imported cedar and were thus being placed in Capital Account. He would recommend himself, permanent bridges of steel and—greystone when we

procured an additional revenue. In conclusion he referred to the Fort Augustus district which he had continuously represented for sixteen years while the Leader of the Opposition had moved from district to district and it was even rumored that he was last summer seeking a nomination in the Third District of Queens.

Mr. Mathieson on a question of privilege protested against the Government stenographer reporting the Liberal speakers alone, and Hon. Mr. Cumminsley replied that the Leader of the Opposition could have been reported if he had asked.

Capt. Read followed asserting that the expenditure at the present time though in excess of the Conservative rule was not extravagant and could not be curtailed. The agricultural department recently inaugurated meant an expenditure of \$10,000 in itself. He dealt at considerable length with the depreciation in Prince Edward Island owing to our unnatural union with the Dominion as a result of the absence of continuous communication in winter. He advocated making the P. W. College scholarships annual instead of every second year as at present. He outlined the purchase of the Government hay at Quebec, the difficulties of procuring cars for transportation and the rise in price at Quebec by which the purchase had to be quickly made, the cessation of free carriage and its renewal at the instance of the speaker and Sir Wilfrid Laurier to whom he appealed. There has been no discrimination in distribution and no charges have been made except from a little coterie in Kings County. At 5:30 he moved the adjournment of the debate.

The bill to amend the Prohibition Act was read a first time and set down for second reading.

House adjourned till 10 a. m.


