Lloyd George's Heir Is Disinherited

LONDON, May 29 — (Tuesday) — (Reuters) — The Daily Mail reported today that the late Earl Lloyd George, Britain's first Great War Prime Minister reported to have made more than \$4,000,000 from his war memoirs and other writings, left nothing to his heir, formerly Maj. Richard Lloyd George.

The Daily Mail said this was disclosed by the new Earl who, discussing his father's will, told the newspaper last night: "I am left nothing at all. My father was always very disappointed because I would not follow in his footsteps as a politician. I never did want to go into politics and I never shall. But it was something my father could never understand. That is why he has not left me a bean in his will."

The new Earl said he would have to get back to his job as a civil engineer if he was going to have any money.

Serious Shortage of Graduate Nurses

OTTAWA, May 29 — (CP) — Mrs. Rex Eaton, director of the Selective Service, said today there still was a serious shortage of graduate nurses and hospital attendants all across Canada, particularly in the Prairie Provinces, with "literally hundreds" of graduate nurses still required.

"Through appeals to immediately accept new assignments has ended their vacations and through nurses declining less essential requirements, a good deal of the deficiency has been made up," Mrs. Eaton said in a statement.

Besides the gloom caused by the deaths on the war front our parish lost two valued members and their work in parish will be sadly missed.

Our sick friends were remembered with treats and social service consisted of teaching catechism, visiting the sick and bereaved, also giving hospitality to needy people and caring for them. Yarn was received and distributed among members, and gloves, socks and sweaters were knit and forwarded to Red Cross. Donation to T. B. fund was forwarded and acknowledged. One member donated blood.

Members sent donations to Precious Blood Sisters which was gratefully acknowledged. Masses were offered for the living and deceased members, also for our boys on active service, who are taking part in the present conflict.

We sponsored nine entertainments during the year also chicken supper. Total amount of money raised \$610.11. Our pastor received a good share of this and the balance was expended in paying for music for entertainments, advertising, gas, oil, wax and dishes for hall, also groceries, etc., for parochial house while Sisters were teaching catechism during vacation school. Donated funds to pay for bed for new Souris Hospital. Donated a substantial sum to St. Andrew's Society. Also purchased new lace and linens for our altars the sewing being done by our capable and courteous treasurer assisted by a member.

Our parish was again honored by two of our members entering the novitiate of the Sisters of Martha. It gave us much pleasure to present each with a gift. It was also a pleasant task to remember our beloved pastor at Christmas with a gift.

Aussie Minister Opposes Great Nation Veto
SAN FRANCISCO, May 26 — (CP) — Herbert V. Ewart, Australia's External Affairs Minister, today termed the great-nation veto power over peaceful settlement of international disputes "preposterous" and a "dangerous blot" on a proposed world charter.

The leader of Australia's delegation handed to a press conference a formal statement on the largest issue still confronting the United Nations conference.

Dr. Ewart, replying to questions, said he believed "there is a distinct majority" of conference members in favor of lifting the veto from investigations and peaceful settlements.

Asked whether Australia would fight on in open conference sessions if the "big power" veto interpretation does not go far enough, Dr. Ewart replied, "we'll make that hurdle when we come to it."

Dr. Ewart said Canada and New Zealand were strongly supporting the delegation's stand against the veto power.

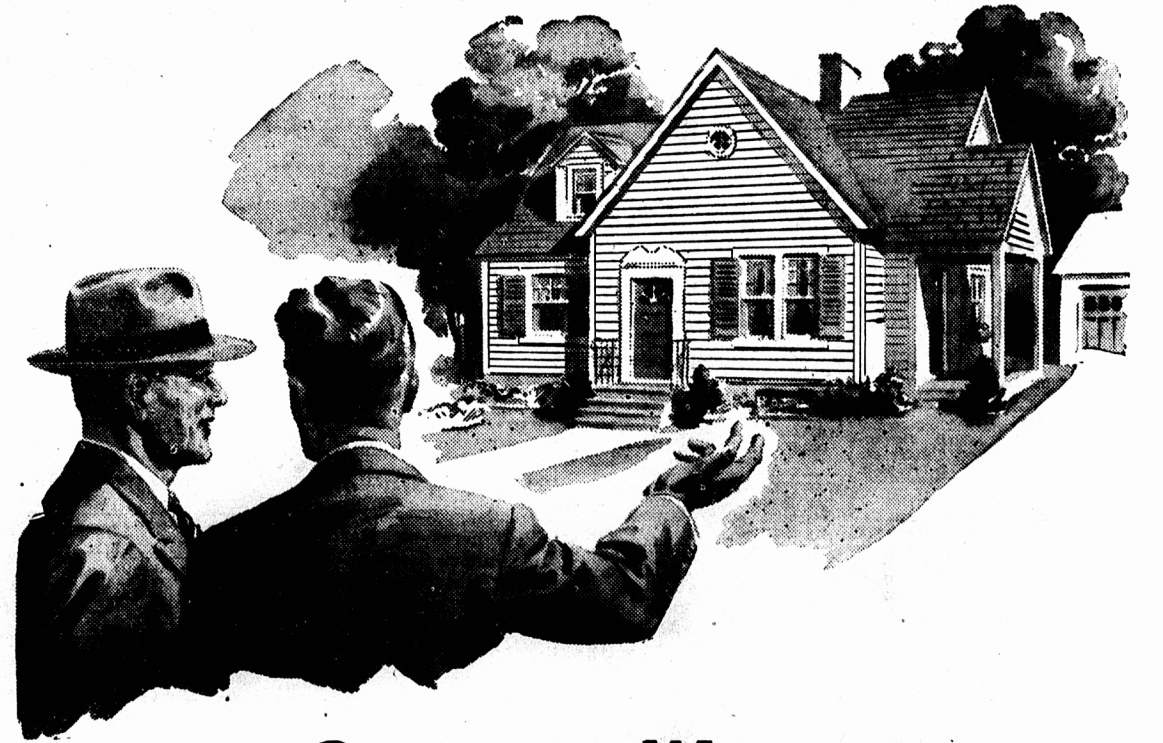
