Morning Stock Letter

NEW YORK, Sept. 10—Iron Age continues optimistic concerning the steel industry. Preliminary reports from car loadings which will be published on Friday indicate a favorable showing. Goodrich stockholders yesterday approved a plan for readjusting the capitalization and directors declared \$1.25 quarterly dividend on the new \$5 cumulative pfd. Dividend meetings today are Addressograph Devoe and Reynolds, and Electric Storage Battery. The Journal of Commerce carries the story this morning that there is some chance that theatre admission prices will be raised slightly for the fall and winter season. Higher admission prices would enable the producers to get higher rentals for films. We would expect an irregular opening this morning and believe there is a good possibility that the advance will be resumed this afternoon or tomorrow.

TORONTO, Sept. 10—Falconbridge—Falconbridge Nickel office make following announcement: "We have been advised from Sudbury that due to damage by fire to number 3 power plant of hydro system, supply of power to Falconbridge may be interfered with necessitating some temporary shut-down of smelter operations. Situation being fully investigated and more definite reports will be issued by the company."

Parkhill—Production for August showed gross recovery of \$39,000 compared with July output of \$24,320. It would seem to indicate higher grade ore going through mill.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10—Chevrolet Car and Truck sales August were 95,050 units, the second largest August in company's history.

Wheat closed firm at the same as yesterday's finish to 1-2 cent higher, Sept 111 1-2 to 5-8, Dec 110 1-2 to 5-8, corn 1-4 off to 1 3-8 up, Sep 111 3-8 to 1-2, Dec 94 3-4 to 7-8, oats unchanged to 1-8 lower, and provisions unchanged to 12 cents down.

The French franc closed in New York at 65 1/2 cents, .00 1-8 of a cent higher.

The pound sterling dropped 1-4 of a cent to \$5.05 1-2 following establishment of a two-year high on Wednesday. The Canadian dollar closed at par, against a premium of 1-64 of one per cent yesterday.

MINING

TORONTO, Sept. 10—Gold stocks got the break in today's mining share market and closed higher while other groups recorded a moderate decline. Volume was the heaviest in a month at 2443,000 shares. A group of the juniors of both the gold and base metals groups were accorded the main attention and these changed hands in quantity, most of them finishing the day at a higher price level.

After displaying strength in several sessions the base metals were inclined to ease off. Falconbridge was weakened by the power plant fire at Wainwright which will entail closing down for repairs and the price dropped 15 cents to 950. Hudson Bay lost 1-4, Sherritt 2 cents, Base Metals Corporation 4 1-2 and Aldermac 2. Noranda gained 1-2 and Chromium 21.

Trading was heavy in Eldorado and the close at 133 was up 7. Castle lost 5 cents and Bear added 1 1-2. In the senior golds a gain of 5-8 for McIntyre was the main change. Bralorne added 15 and Wright Hargreaves lost 5. Lake Shore, Dome and Pioneer were unchanged.

Toburn pulled away from the medium price gold group to close 30 cents higher at 290. San Antonio jumped ahead 23 cents to 1.93 on the announcement of a 7-cent dividend and gains of 3 to 5 cents were posted for McLeod-Cockshott, Granada, Central Manitoba, Chibougamau, Canadian Malartic and Sladen.
