LONDON, Ont., Nov. 27—A real partnership of interests between husband and wife is revealed in the registration at the Medical School of the University of Western Ontario of E. H. Brown, and his wife Gertrude. Both have had considerable experience in the healing art, since both are trained nurses. They served in Great Britain during the great war in connection with Red Cross work. Mrs. Brown, at the outbreak of the war was stationed at Belfast, Ireland, doing public health work. During the period of the war she taught several hundred V. A. D. girls in 1922, she came to the United States, where she received an appointment as medical matron at the sanatorium at Battle Creek, Michigan. Mr. Brown was rejected for active service in the great war, so devoted his energies to nursing. Mr. and Mrs. Brown will require five years to complete the course in which they have registered.
