

CITIZENSHIP OF WOMEN

An address by Miss Salome Halderon, M.L.A., at the Manitoba District Annual Convention, gives us this interesting information on the present crisis.

"Women will play an important part in the moulding of the world tomorrow with the two conflicting types of government. The Totalitarian type is the rule of the weak by the strong, the many by the few. The Democratic type has as its basis principle the rights of the individual. Love thy neighbor as thyself. A deadly conflict between these two philosophies is taking place today in the war zones of Europe.

I do not wish to be understood as saying that the countries in the democratic bloc have attained democracy. What we have is a condition of wide poverty, insecurity and unemployment. We cannot say we have democracy, or government, or anything in the nature of it, but these nations have the idea of democracy and also the forms of it in their free institutions, such as parliament. Had they been able to evolve a functioning democracy in time, they would have saved the world from this war.

The contrast between these philosophies is not confined to the war zone.

Democracy envisages a social system built upon the free association of individuals voluntarily co-operating because they are getting the results they want. The essential feature of democracy is the sovereignty of the people, and a functioning democracy must yield the people the maximum personal security and freedom. It is built on the greatest possible decentralization of power. In contrast, the totalitarian system is based on the pagan principle of the control, domination and subordination of the many by the few. It has its roots in the law of the jungle—the strongest or most brutal, or most cunning, shall rule. It is a system of individual rights, individual rights. The people exist for the state, symbolized by its ruling group. Sovereign power is concentrated in the hands of a few. It means the absolute centralization of power.

The triumph of the Allies in the war was the triumph of the defeat of totalitarianism, though it necessarily precedes it.

Matthew Arnold once said: "If we are to have a world which men shall come together simply and solely for the benefit of mankind it will be such a force as the world has never known. It was never even a greater need for such a force than now?

Our first great need is a thorough understanding of what democracy really is. This means careful study. What have women to contribute to the great social problem of making democracy work that has not been contributed by men?

There is a fundamental difference between the mind of man and the mind of woman—women possess an intuitive ability to arrive at the right conclusion, while man is the "doer" after a laborious reasoning process. There must be a combination of the two types of mind translated into action by the doer.

It is most necessary that women should realize their powers and duties in the larger field of social action. I render there a similar distinctive service as she does in the smaller sphere of home. But this means trained minds and self-sacrificing effort.

STONE AGE SOCIOLOGY

When so much emphasis is being put upon material progress in this day of an obvious moral and spiritual slump the following appeal of Dr. Matthew Luckiesh, director of lighting research for the General Electric Company in an address before the student body of Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, Troy, N. Y., 4, as quoted in the New York Times, is refreshing. Dr. Luckiesh said:

"Must Carry Modern Science Into Society"

The popular notion that we live in a scientific age is pathetically false in many ways.

It is true that in the material world we may rightfully boast of a scientific age, but this is not true in the sociological world. We must carry our modern scientific movement into the sociological world, for only in doing so is there hope for our civilization.

"I must move into the sociological world and make inventions, products and processes there just as soundly as it has for the material world. The same spirit and method can do just as much for the sociological world as it has done and will do for the material world.

"But this can only be accomplished through the aid of public demand. Our voters must admit modern science into the sociological world. While the physical sciences are learning the secrets of atoms and stars, economists, politicians and governments are chipping flint in a stone age."

REGISTRATION STARTS ON MONDAY August 19th

Commencing Monday, August 19th, Canada calls on her citizens, 16 years of age and over, regardless of nationality, to register. Because of the magnitude of this task the Government asks those who must register to study the questionnaire carefully. Every question must be answered truthfully and without evasion. It is imperative that every one 16 years of age and over register. You will make the whole task easier for yourself and the Government by registering early. Registration will last for three days only.

REGISTRATION DATES August 19th, 20th, 21st

EVERYONE CAN HELP—To keep the cost of this registration at a minimum the Government is asking the co-operation of all public-minded citizens in the work of registration. You can help by getting in touch with your local registration officials and offering your services.

WHERE TO REGISTER

Registration offices are being set up by electoral districts in the same manner as in the last Dominion election.

Registrars are required to register in the regular polling subdivisions of their own constituencies. But should a registrar be in some other province or district out of the regular polling subdivision on Registration Days, he or she may register at any registration office convenient, upon satisfactory explanation to the local deputy registrar.

Your Registration Certificate

To every person answering the questionnaire fully and satisfactorily a certificate of registration will be issued by the local deputy registrar. This is a small card which must be carried on the person at all times.

Penalty for Non-Registration—Failure to register will make any male or female, married or single, over the age of 16 years, liable to a fine not exceeding two hundred dollars, or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months, or to both such fine and imprisonment, and moreover to a further penalty not exceeding ten dollars for each day, after the day upon which he should have registered, during which he shall continue to be unregistered.

Flag Still Flutters From Nelson's Ship

PORTSMOUTH, Aug. 15.—(CP Cable)—The flag of the commander-in-chief of the British fleet, Lord Nelson's old flagship, H.M.S. Victory, the famous ship, which the Germans claimed was damaged in an air raid on this naval base, has not been touched.

"The ship has taken some buffeting in her time and she came through all right Monday," an officer told reporters who were shown the wooden veteran in drydock here since she was completely "restored" in 1928. There was no sign of damage anywhere.

The German propaganda radio had claimed the victory's mast and flag were toppled overboard by the shock of a bomb dropping near her in the water.

A poll has been set-up in the Charlottetown Post Office building, 2nd floor, J. F. MacLeod, Registrar, at which all Dominion Government employees (excepting Railroads) and their families over 16 years of age will register.

Law Offices And National Registration

The Law Society of Prince Edward Island has been requested by the Federal Minister of National War Services as well as by the President of the Canadian Bar Association to render every assistance in its power in seeing that the registration in this Province for war service of all men and women of the age of 16 years and upwards is accomplished successfully.

In response to this request the members of the Council of the Law Society have unanimously offered to close their respective law offices on the dates for registration, namely, August 19, 20 and 21, so that they may devote their full time during these days to National Registration. The Council of the Law Society has also, by resolution passed unanimously, recommended that every lawyer in the Province give similar assistance during the days fixed for registration, and that every law student and experienced stenographer in such offices be set free to assist in such National Registration.

As the questions to be answered in such Registration may need to be explained in order that they may be correctly answered and as this is work which the training and experience of members of the legal profession and of their students and clerks make them specially qualified to perform, the Council of the Law Society hopes that all lawyers and their students and clerks who can do so shall give every assistance possible in such Registration.

The service asked for is, of course, to be performed voluntarily and the Council asks the co-operation of the public in arranging any visits to any law offices they may be contemplating so as to leave the members of the legal profession and their staffs free to assist in such National Registration on Aug. 19, 20 and 21.
