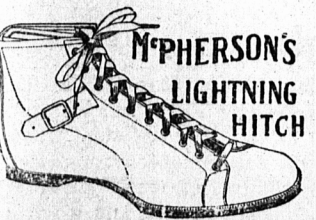

"We understand," says the St. John, N. B. We understand also that it has been suggested to His Excellency to make a general presentation of the medals to the tee-totalers in the province."

She leaves to mourn a sorrowing husband, one son James, at home, and four daughters, Bridget at home, Maggie and Annie in New York, and Minnie, Mrs. James M. Hughes; also three sisters and one brother. The funeral took place on Sunday morning at Sturgeon church, which was filled with a large concourse of her friends and neighbors. High Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Wm. Phalen and her body was then laid to rest in Sturgeon cemetery.—Com.

THE Merchant Service Guild have been informed by the Secretary of the Northern Lighthouse Board that it has been proposed to establish a fully-equipped lighthouse, with a powerful flashing light, on Neist Point on the west side of Skye, and that it is also proposed to greatly increase the power of the light on Island Glass, and to alter it from fixed to flashing. The opinions of the Guild, which in the past has strongly urged additional lights and fog signals on the West Coast of Scotland, are asked for by the Commissioners, and these important proposals are receiving full consideration.

For many years the publishers of the "Farmer's Advocate and Home Magazine," of London, Ont., have given to the public holiday issues, which, in matter and manner, were an honor to Canadian agriculture and Canadian journalism, and the Christmas number for 1905 is not behind its predecessors in any respect. As always, the illustrations form an exceedingly attractive feature of the paper, being many of them scenes particularly suited to the uses of an agricultural paper which is Dominion-wide in its interests. Father Burke, President of P. E. I. Fruit-growers Association; Hon. John Dryden; Linus Woolverton; the presidents of the Canadian Agricultural Colleges, and others. A thoughtful and clear exposition of the advantages of the proposed Georgian Bay canal, the new Canadian waterway, has been contributed, and another article worthy of notice is one on the suitability of Northern Ontario for successful agriculture, by Thomas Southworth, Director of Colonization.

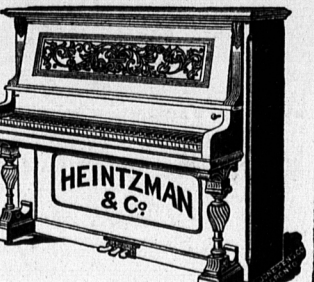
