### DEATH OF REV. D. SUTHERLAND.

Rev. David Sutherland the beloved pastor of Zion Church is no more. After lingering for days very close to the border which divides the mortal from the immortal state, his spirit passed peacefully away about 12 o'clock last night.

Mr Sutherland had been pastor of Zion Church for about eight years, and previously spent some years in Halifax, to which city he came from Scotland. In his ministry he was most earnest and useful. "He was a faithful man and one that feared God above many."

THE GUARDIAN extends heartfelt sympathy to the bereaved family, in which the entire community will join. The loss is one that will long be sadly felt not only in Zion Church, where the deceased Pastor was greatly beloved, but in every sphere of moral and Christian activity in our city and throughout the Island.

### CANADIAN TREATY MAKING.

The appointments made by the imperial government of representatives to the Quebec commission, shows a largely increased recognition of the Canadian claim to the treaty making power. In the negotiations at Washington in the earlier years of confederation, at which the treaty of Washington was framed it was thought quite a distinction that Canada was permitted to have a man on the High Commission. Sir John Macdonald was there, and he was the only Canadian.

Now we are to have another High Commission with a great change in the personnel representing the British side of the case. Baron Herschell is the only imperial statesman in the quota and he is associated with four distinguished Canadians, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Sir Louis Davies, Sir Richard Cartwright and John Charlton M.P. It is true that the questions to be now settled are more exclusively Canadian than they were when the Washington treaty was framed. At that time the Alabama question was disturbing the peace of the two great English speaking nations. But the question of the Atlantic fisheries, the navigation of the St. Lawrence river and canals, and the Stickeen and the Yukon then at issue, was as purely Canadian as any of the matters now to be considered.

The Liberal party in Canada have been pioneers in claiming for Canada the right to negotiate her own commercial treaties, as they were in enacting a tariff giving to the Mother Country a preference in our markets. No doubt the latter fact has reacted upon the imperial government in a favorable way. Be that as it may Canada will be represented on the Quebec Commission with such numbers and ability of her own leading statesmen and diplomats as never before fell to her lot on a like occasion.

And the step is not only a notable recognition for Canada, but all patriots: Canadians will view it as a step in the right direction. It is well that the Commission has a distinctly British representative among its members. The experience, skill and resources of British diplomacy are unsurpassed. And yet no man from the British Isles can have the same full and detailed knowledge of Canadian conditions and requirements, or be so well equipped to guard our every interest as are the Canadian members of the Commission.

Three at least of the four Canadians whom the Imperial Government has selected for this important duty stand in the first rank of Canadian statesmanship in point of ability. They are well-informed, resourceful, polished and capable, and we believe will be found equal to the best they will meet in the great international council at Quebec. We shall be hopeful that their patriotic efforts will command success if success is possible. At any rate the appointment of four Canadians out of five British representatives is a notable departure, which establishes a precedent for the future in the negotiation of treaties affecting Canada.

### THE TUNE CHANGED.

#### Madrid Learns the Fate of Cervera's Squadron.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—The captured Spanish admiral, Cervera, was given permission to-day to communicate with his family in Spain by cable. Permission was also granted to other captured Spanish officers to use the cable to transmit personal messages to friends in Spain. The messages will of course be carefully censored.

LONDON, July 5.—The Madrid correspondent of the Times says:

"Admiral Cervera's family have received a telegram professionally from him, stating that he is a prisoner; but its authenticity is doubted. The following is the only official despatch the government has received since yesterday:

"At dusk last night they received the Soapa battery, seven shipwrecked men from the sunken torpedo boat destroyers. They said the Infanta Maria Teresa was steaming in a damaged condition behind Point Buzer, out of sight of the town and that the Almirante Oquendo was afloat. Subsequently other sailors. I do not know how many, got ashore and confirmed the above.

"The enemy attacked our forces during the morning, causing us a loss of seven wounded. Col. Escadio's column has arrived.

"The despatch goes on to describe the intervention of the foreign consuls at Santiago and the offer of the Americans to delay bombardment on the morning of July 5, provided the Spaniards refrain from attacking them. It concludes with the words:

"I have agreed."

MADRID, July 5. 8 P. M.—Senor Sagasta, the premier, has announced officially that Admiral Cervera's squadron has been defeated, that the Almirante Oquendo was burned and that the Infanta Maria Teresa sunk and that Admiral Cervera himself is a prisoner of war. The despatch containing the information has not yet been fully deciphered.
