

REMOVING DANGER FROM THE STREETS

PARIS, Dec. 11 (Special)—M. Ambrose Randu will shortly lay before the Municipal Council of Paris a series of measures intended to diminish the dangers of the streets. Several of these measures have already been canvassed, but not a few are both drastic and novel. The following are examples:—

"Every motor vehicle shall be provided with a speedometer of a type to be approved by the Prefect of Police. In case of accident, the chauffeur will be held fully responsible if his speedometer registers a speed of over fifteen miles an hour."

"Any chauffeur who has been held responsible for an accident shall have his license withdrawn for a period of two years. The same penalty shall apply to the chauffeur who takes flight after any accident whatsoever."

LONDON, Dec. 11 (Special)—Herbert Vivian, in a recent lecture, alluded to an extraordinary superstition connected with the wild dogs of Constantinople. These dogs were supposed by many to bring good luck to the city, and though a dog is deemed unclean by all good Moslems, they were well-treated by the populace. But the powers that be one day removed the dogs to an island where they were allowed to die in awful torture by starvation, and with their disappearance has departed the good luck of Constantinople. Certainly, the Turks have fallen upon evil times, but whether the wild dogs have anything to do with the fact is quite another matter.

WAR'S MISERIES AND PHILATELISTS

MUNICH, Dec. 10 (Special)—It has by now become a commonplace that the misery of war makes the joy of the stamp-collector. The war in the Near East will be no exception, says the "Munchener Neueste Nachrichten," for in a few days philatelists will rejoice over an event that is unique in the history of postage stamps. The stamps issued by the Allies for the conquered provinces are to be all of the same type in design and decoration; the only difference between the stamps of the various States being that the vignette in the middle will be a picture of Sofia in the case of Bulgaria; of Belgrade for Serbia; the Cetinje for Montenegro; and of Athens for Greece.

The design of the new stamps is originally Greek, being an artist's adaptation of an idea furnished by the Director of the Numismatic Museum at Athens. Above the four capital cities floats the same luminous cloud, wherein a fiery cross appears with the inscription: "In hoc signo vinces." It is a crusade stamp.

STILL DISCUSSING HOME RULE BILL

Complimentary Dinner Given to Delegates. John Redmond National Leader Present And Responded to The Toast. Few Words of Opposition

DUBLIN, Dec. 11 (Special)—At the toast of "Our Guests," said large and representative assembly of London Irishmen met at the Holborn Restaurant last Saturday night to welcome W. A. Redmond, M. P., and R. Hazleton, M. P., who, with J. T. Donovan, of Belfast, toured the Australian Colonies on behalf of the Irish Party and for the purpose of collecting funds for the furtherance of the Home Rule cause. A complimentary dinner was given to the delegates by the Irish Parliament Branch of the United Irish League of Great Britain. John O'Connor, M. P., presided, and John Redmond, the Nationalist leader, was present.

W. A. Redmond, M. P., responding to the toast of "Our Guests," said the outstanding feature of their tour was the marvelous unanimity and universality of their reception. Everywhere they went they were received and accompanied by public men and representatives of the people. There was scarcely a word of opposition from one end of Australia to the other. If a plebiscite of the Empire was taken on the question of Home Rule, and he challenged the Unionists to take it, then it would be found that Australia and New Zealand, and no doubt Canada also, would plump in favor of restoring to Ireland her national rights.

CHILD LABOR IN FRANCE

PARIS, Dec. 11 (Special)—A pitiful tale was told to the magistrates who recently inquired into the conditions under which a number of little Spanish boys were employed in a glass factory at St. Denis. A complaint had been lodged by the Spanish Embassy and the Syndical Committee, and when the head of the police visited the place he found scores of boys, many under the legal age of 13, employed in labor altogether unfitness and much too severe for their strength.

The managers of the works declared that the children were brought to them by contractors, and all they had to do was to verify their papers and see that they were of the legal age. "They never receive less than 41 cents a day, and we can assure you that they are not at all ill-treated by our staff. What happens to them when they leave the factory we cannot tell, but it is clear that they are very badly looked after. Their 'patrons' pick them up in their families, pay the journey from Spain to Paris, and then become their complete masters. We have often tried to make observations to these men, but they will not listen, and say that they can do as they please."

When the magistrates interrogated the children they all declared that they were "13 years old," and were "well treated and well fed, and had nothing to complain of." Their lamentable condition eloquently contradicted what was only too evidently a lesson they had learned and been told to repeat under threats of punishment. Even the judge and police, who are case-hardened, were moved to pity and distributed bread and chocolate to the poor little wails, who threw themselves upon the food with such ravenous avidity that the falsity of their previous answers was manifest.

DEATH OF FAMOUS MAORI CHIEF

WELLINGTON, N. Z., Dec. 11 (Special)—Hori Ngatai, one of the most famous Maori chiefs, has died at Whareroa, New Zealand, and some remarkable scenes took place when visitors and territorial officers paid a visit to where the remains of the chief lay in state. The mayor and councillors of Tauranga were received by the friends of Hori Ngatai, who were fired by a party of Maoris, and afterwards war dances were performed. The ceremonies were carried on into the night long after the visitors had left.

With the death of this famous chief an important personage in the native population has disappeared. Hori Ngatai fought against the whites at the Gate Pa and Te Kaha, but afterwards took a prominent part in the peace negotiations, and it is asserted that it was largely because of his great influence with his own people that friendly relations were established between the Europeans and the Maori races. He was appointed by the Government to the post of assessor of the native land court, and, on many occasions, he represented his people on deputations to the Government here. When the Duke and Duchess of York visited Rotorua, Hori Ngatai received them and presented the Duke with many valuable presents. In return he received a medal. The dead chief was noted for his hospitality to whites who occasionally passed through his district.

TSETSE FLY CAUSES DAMAGE

BULAWAYO, South Africa, Dec. 11 (Special)—The tsetse fly is playing more than usual havoc in North-Eastern Rhodesia, rendering ox-wagon transport impossible over wide areas. Paraffin motors have been introduced to fill the void.
