GRAIN

CHICAGO, Nov. 30—(AP)—The best buying the grain market has experienced since the September war boom caused wheat prices to jump 1 to 2 cents a bushel today to the highest level in almost two years. Corn, Oats and Rye also were higher while Soy Beans rose 4 1-4 cents to \$1.08 from December delivery, highest in two days.
 Wheat closed 1-2 cents higher, Dec 91 5-8-3-4, May 89 7-8-88; Corn 1 1-2-2 1-8 up, Dec 53-53 1-4, May 54 7-8-55; Oats 5-8-7-8 higher.
WINNIPEG, Nov. 30—(CP)—Wheat futures prices continued their climb on the Winnipeg grain exchange today and for the first time in more than two months advanced to positions above the 80-cent mark. Excellent buying by the mills, exporters and commission houses, together with light offerings, were responsible for the strong tone of the market.
 Final quotations were 1 5-8-1 1-2 cents ahead, with Dec wheat at 75 1-4 cents a bushel May 72 3-4 and July 81 cents.
 Wheat values at Chicago jumped 1-2 cent while Buenos Aires prices were up 1-8-3-8 cents near the close.
 Best buyers in the cash wheat market were mills who took good quantities of the top northern grades as well as come no 3. garnet and no. 4 special. In addition to this mill interest, exporters were credited with fair purchases of nos. 1 and 2 northern.
 In the coarse grain pit export buyers gave support to oats and barley while southern interests picked up a little Winnipeg rye against sales at Chicago.

MONTEAL, Nov. 30—(CP)— Apart from utilities, stocks moved in reverse on the market today, losing fractions to about two points. The decline, however, took place in quiet trading with 64,500 shares changing hands.
 In construction, point losses appeared for Asbestos and Steel of Canada, while General Steel Wares dropped 1-4. Noranda, Nickel was off 1 3-4. Noranda one, Smelters 3-4 and Hudson Bay Mining and Bulolo 1-2 each.
 The rail action sported setbacks with losers being Canadian Car common, Doco, C. P. R., and National Steel. Montreal Power preferred dropped three points and St. Lawrence Corporation preferred 1 3-4. Down fractionally were Howard Smith, Bathurst, Dryden, Imperial Tobacco and Canada Steamships. Seagrams fell back one and Oglive 1-4.
 In utilities, Shawinigan eased 1-4, but Brazilian, Bell Telephone, B. C. Power, Galtineau, Montreal Power and Power Corporation held even.

NEW YORK, Nov. 30—(AP)— Settling, attributed partly to bearishness inspired by the outbreak of war between Russia and Finland, today pushed the stock market to new lows.
 Loses ran to around 3 points for leaders in the forenoon, but late short covering and some buying based on the belief the decline had gone too far, substantially lessened the decline as the close. Final quotations also included a sprinkling of modest plus signs.
 The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was off 5 of a point at 50.
 Dealings were fastest in the morning when stop-loss orders were touched off.
 Tending to depress sentiment "wokers" said, was the thought that the spread of the European conflict might bring complications which could have repercussions.
 In the United States, Trading force inclined to shave some of their holdings and await clarification of the new turn of foreign affairs.
 On the Canadian list Distillers, Dome Mines, International Nickel, Brazilian Reaction and Marconi dipped slightly while Bell Telephone advanced one point to 137.
 Steels, motors, aircrafts and chemicals were hit hardest at the start although the majority stead-
