The New Glasgow Bulletin says: It is rumored that Rudyard Kipling will spend the summer at Baddeck, C. B.

PREMIER MURRAY left Halifax for England on Saturday, on public business. Next month some of the provincial bonds held in England mature, and the Premier considers the present an opportune time to consolidate the whole provincial debt. By this consolidation Premier Murray hopes to save considerable yearly interest to the province. Mrs. Murray will accompany her husband across the water.

LAKE VERD NOTES.—The action of the Government is calling forth much comment. Has the problem of the liquor traffic been at last solved? It would appear so. Mr. Prowse, was in favor of "restriction," when he made the amendment that the saloons be allowed to remain open until 10 p. m. on market days. An ideal mode of restriction! What we want on the political bill of fare is not a "turn-over" but a "turnout." The fact that the opposition voted against the measure argues nothing in their favor, for while their member in the House of Commons was urging the claims of the province to a bridge across the Hillsborough, the opposition voted against it, and according to precedent it is probable that were it possible for a want of confidence motion to be brought in as a government measure they would vote against it. Our roads here have never been in a worse condition since previous to the Peters regime. That part known in local phraseology as Murphy's Hollow, is particularly in need of repairs. Scarcely a carriage passes over the ruts without something being shaken out. Coats, cloaks and even side combs have been picked up. Persons with removable ivories are warned to clutch them tightly while passing over this road. There is only one way of settling this political question. The difference in party politics is scarcely perceptible. Then let the temperance organizations, the temperance people get out their own candidates and let this great question be the distinctive feature, the party line. By doing this and working together they would really do more for the temperance cause than "all the talking that has been done."

HALIFAX MARKETS

Potatoes 10c. a Bushel Lower.

P. E. I. GLUTS MARKET

The S. S. Halifax and City of Ghent's Large Cargoes, of Island Produce.

HALIFAX, June 3.—The features of the market this week are the advance in flour and the decline in potatoes. The first is worth 25 cents more per barrel than a week ago and potatoes will bring only within 10 cents per bushel of what they were selling for at The Herald's last quotation.

The weakness of the potato market here is the result of a decline in Boston, and the consequent glutting of this market. Halifax is almost completely glutted with potatoes, dealers in many cases—with prices of P. E. Island potatoes at 45 cents and New Brunswick at 50 cents—which are the outside that can be obtained in a jobbing way—are selling at less than they paid. As soon as the P. E. Island dealers found Boston weaker they turned their attention to Halifax, in a way that was stronger than we could stand. The steamer Halifax brought 1,500 bushels on her last trip, the City of Ghent the same quantity, two cargoes aggregating 3,000 bushels, arrived this week. One dealer has 3,000 bushels of New Brunswick potatoes and another has 1,200. This is but a portion of the stock in the city. The price for the future depends on Boston. If there is an advance there Halifax will benefit, but if not dealers here will have hard work in disposing of their stocks without more or less loss.

Turnips are worth more, the quotation now standing \$1.00 to \$1.10. Carrots are very scarce, the nominal quotation being \$1.25 per bushel.

In dairy produce the main change is in cheese, the quotation for new declining from 11 cents to about 10½ cents, with a tendency still further downward. There is no change in butter. Eggs still hold at 9 cents, though in P. E. Island they are as high as 10½ cents.

Light pork is worth a half cent more compared with heavy. The demand for beef has been better, in accordance with the season. Fowls are lower. Hides are firmer at 7 cents to 7½ cents, and lambskins are worth from 10 cents to 15 cents.

Flour is 25 cents per barrel higher than a week or so ago.
