CHATHAM, N. LONDON, Aug. 8.—Imperial Conference agreed that war reparations receipts be apportioned as follows: Great Britain 86.35 per cent, Minor Colonies 80 per cent, Canada 4.35 per cent, New Zealand 1.75 per cent, South Africa 60 per cent, Newfoundland 40 per cent, India 1.20 per cent.

Fire Causing Great Damage In New Brunswick

ST. JOHN, Aug. 8.—Nearly three score residences of southern Kings County and Queens and numerous other buildings and barns, garages, ice-houses, were destroyed by showers of sparks from forest fires yesterday afternoon and last evening. No lives were lost. The financial loss of Kings County is estimated at \$400,000 against which insurance amounts to \$100,000. Fourteen dwellings were burned at Onnette, twenty-two at Hillendale, ten at Lingley, one at Sagwa,

one at Nerepis. These are villages along the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, within twelve or fifteen miles of St. John. The county of Queens, seven houses and a church burned at Upper Cagetown causing a further loss of \$25,000. The Methodist Church at Hilldale was also burned as was the sawmill of McDonald Brothers at Welsford, located at Lingley Station.
