VOTERS WOULD LIKE PROVINCES, OTTAWA TO TRY AGAIN. ELECTION NOT IN DEMAND

Blame for Breakdown of Conference Put Equally on Dominion and Legislatures

TORONTO, June 15 - Most powerful, and yet least published delegate to the recent fruitless conference between Provincial and Federal Governments at Ottawa was the Canadian public itself.

AN ELECTION OF ANOTHER CONFERENCE. ELECTION 33%, UNDECIDED 19%, CONFERENCE 48% OVER DOMINION-PROVINCIAL AFFAIRS?

On the question of allocating blame for the breakdown, as between the Federal Government, and the provinces, the public divided almost equally into three camps—those who blame Ottawa, those who blame the provinces, and those who think both Federal and provincial authorities were to blame.

Another interesting feature of the breakdown was that those who blame the Ottawa Government for the breakdown are, by long odds, the most clamorous for a Federal election, or at least a Dominion election, six to ten years hence.

Those who did put the blame on the provinces, were asked further: "Which Province (Do You Think Were Most to Blame for the Failure of the Conference)?"

Ontario 21%, Quebec 20%, Maritime 2%, Prairie 2%, All provinces 1%, No provinces named 1%

The percentages add to more than 24 per cent who blamed the provinces, because many people named more than one (eg. Ontario and Quebec).

(Continued from Page 1) to the United States for that information. It did not indicate that we intended to do so, but it said our ordinance people certainly could produce a bomb that would be as good as any we make in this country."

Mr. Howe, touching on practical results of the energy, said "I am hopeful that means will be found to convert it into usable heat at a reasonable cost."

There were not 30 men in Canada qualified to follow through the whole process of atomic energy.

He said "there will never be a free market for uranium—no current source of the energy—in this or any other country. If uranium is produced (privately) the Government will take steps to acquire and control it."

The explosive material from which atomic bombs could be made was "being accumulated."

"We are building up the chain reaction. It will be used for experimental purposes, for medical purposes, for industrial purposes, for military purposes. We shall distribute the by-product material for medical use."

They should be available "a few months in the future."

Mr. Howe said the total capital outlay on the Chalk River, Ontario atomic development plant would be \$20,000,000 but he could not say how much of that would be spent this year.

The Crown-owned uranium-producing Eldorado Mining and Refining Co. in the Northwest Territories was also supporting the plan.

Answering a question by Donald Fleming (P.C.—Toronto, Eng.) Mr. Howe said the Cabinet committee to which the board would be referred would include the Ministers of Reconstruction, Trade, Mines and Resources, Defence, Health, Finance, Agriculture and Labor.

After hearing Mr. Baruch and deciding that the Australian delegate, Dr. Herbert V. Ewart, would serve as chairman for the first month under a rotation plan, the Council adjourned until next Wednesday.

Several delegates praised the delegation generally, but withheld comment on the detailed provisions pending further study and consultation with their governments.

Soviet delegate Andrei A. Gromyko said "so far, matters are going smoothly" but added: "I have no comment on the substance of the proposals."

Mr. Baruch said the atomic energy commission had the task of providing the mechanism to assure that atomic energy is used for peaceful purposes and precluded its use for destructive purposes.

The theme of punishment for violators recurred throughout his speech. At one point he suggested that the United States should prescribe individual responsibility and punishment on the principles of action-punishment in the war crimes trials.

He made it clear, however, that it would be up to the committee itself to decide what constituted crimes to be punished and what the penalties would be.

"There must be no veto to protect those who violate their solemn agreements not to develop or use atomic energy for destructive purposes. The bomb does not wait upon debate."

British Labor Party Completes Meeting

Bournemouth, Hants, Eng., June 14 - (CP) - The British Labor Party ended its annual conference here today after five days of non-party sessions.

During the conference, since Labor won the general election last year, the party's policy speeches were made by Foreign Secretary, Lord P. Dalton, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Noel-Baker.

State Minister Noel-Baker was elected Party chairman, succeeding the controversial Prof. Harold Laski, whose speeches often were at variance with Government policy.

The last session ended with a dramatic debate on colonial imperialism and an outline of financial policy and aims by Mr. Dalton.

The colonial debate came after Prof. George Ostlin, recently returned from India called for repudiation of Winston Churchill's earlier statement that the Atlantic Charter did not apply to peoples east of Suez.

The resolution was withdrawn after Arthur Greenwood, Lord Privy Seal, said the Party executive agreed with the substance of the resolution.

Mr. Dalton gave a summary of what the reduced taxes in Britain will do for Britons when they become effective next fall. He said the danger of inflation in Britain has largely passed away under the impact of increased production of goods for home consumption.
