THE Pictou advocate says: The New Glasgow Milling Co. paid from fifteen to twenty thousand dollars to the Prince Edward Island farmers last year for wheat, and expects to pay as much more this year. The company require about 120,000 bushels of wheat annually.

THE Maritime Province Christian Endeavor Convention will be held in Sackville on Sept. 5, 6 and 7. There are in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island 675 societies, the majority of which are in Nova Scotia. There will probably be about 250 delegates present.

THE dredge Prince Edward has finished work at Poole and Lewis' wharf. Yesterday evening she was being made ready to be towed to Malpeque where some dredging will be done. It is probable she will be taken to Malpeque on Wednesday by the Stanley.

EASTERN NOTES.—Though June and July were extremely wet months, and discouraging to the farmer after his experience last year the weather has taken a change in August, and the hay fields present a busy appearance. Some are getting through, and some have considerable to do yet. The crops generally look well, and if the present dry warm weather continues oats, potatoes and wheat will likely be above the average. The early wheat especially, looks finely though some farmers made the mistake of not sowing their White Russian till after the 24th May.—A few mackerel have been taken off the West River and along the North Side, but the fishermen have now no hopes of any old fashioned catch. The best mackerel appears to hang on a bank south of East Point sometimes coming in with the tide on sandy bottom off the West River.—A Yankee vessel has got her fare between hooking and netting on this bank, and inside of it and it is supposed the netting was chiefly done inside the three mile limit where she slipped after night. Twenty or more mackerel nets are tied together, a dog tied to each end and she drifts with the tide all night. This plan if persisted in will finish the little remnant saining has left.—The Kingfisher has not been heard here for some time, and although she were, as she harbors in Souris every night she could not be aware if poachers and trespassers were encroaching on forbidden territory.—This part was well supplied with preachers last Sunday.—Rev. E. A. McPhee, regular pastor, J. A. Gordon, former pastor, and W. G. Mellick, native of this place being in the Baptist church and Rev. Mr. Simpson in the South Lake church. Rev. Mr. Mellick preached acceptably in the former church in the morning, in the latter in the afternoon. Rev. Mr. Gordon preached to his old congregation in the evening, and they were glad to find that he has lost none of his old-time vigor. He has accepted a call to Montreal, and in that great commercial centre, he will find ample scope for his energies, and where his numerous friends wish him many years of health and prosperity.
