OTTAWA, Oct. 14—(CP)—Returns coming into the Resources Department indicate that by the end of the current fiscal year, Canada's national parks will have accommodated about 1,250,000

visitors from Canada and the United States, Resources Minister Glen announced today. He reported plans already were under way for the early development of 80 square miles in Albert County set aside by the New Brunswick Government for national park purposes.
