ACCEPTS CALL.—At a meeting of the Baptist congregation Wednesday evening the resignation of the minister, Rev. C. R. Freeman was received and accepted with the deepest regret. Mr. Freeman has accepted the pastorate of one of the leading Baptist churches in St. John and his departure will be a distinct loss to this city.

HOSPITAL RECONSTRUCTION.—At the meeting held in St. Dunstan's Cathedral on Sunday night to discuss the reconstruction of the Charlottetown Hospital, a committee of three consisting of Mayor Riley, Hon. J. J. Johnston, and L. B. MacMillan was appointed to confer with His Lordship the Bishop re the formation of a central committee to take charge of the work. The names of the following were added to the above named gentlemen to make up the central committee: John MacKenna, Thos. Campbell, F. P. Hennessey, Prof. Henry Blanchard and James Carragher. This committee will select teams to canvass the city. Arrangements are also being made for canvassing the remainder of the province. His Worship Mayor Riley was selected as chairman of the central committee and L. B. MacMillan, Secretary.

EXPERIMENTAL AERIAL SERVICE.—A letter was received in the mail last evening marked on the envelope, "via air line." This letter did not come by aerial post, but an opportunity will be given to the public to send letters from Halifax to Newfoundland by aeroplane. The mail will be despatched from Halifax about the 10th instant. The Post Office Department has agreed to co-operate in the venture provided those sending the mail matter assume the risk. The requirements for this mail are: (1) "Aerial mail" to be prominently marked on the address side of the envelope. (2) The usual postage for a one-ounce letter to be affixed on the address side of the envelope. (3) Additional postage stamps to the value of 30c to be placed on the address side of the envelope in payment of the special charge for transmission by aerial service, which has been fixed at those making the flight. The extra postage stamps will be specially cancelled at the Halifax office and the envelopes will then be a valuable souvenir of the first mail by aerial post out of Canada.

ROTARY LUNCHEON.—Rotary luncheon yesterday afternoon was capably presided over by Rotarian Jas. McKie, the guests present being Col. Brown and Dr. Everett MacNeill of Queens University, Kingston. The principal speaker was Hon. Cyrus W. Crosby, Commissioner of Public Works, Comstock as his subject "Roads." He referred to the great interest which is being taken in this subject all over the world, stating that in the United States next year the estimated expenditure for roads is a billion dollars. Mr. Crosby spoke of the stimulus given to road building in Canada by the Federal Highways Bill. Twenty million dollars are granted on a 60 to 40 per cent basis for five years. The island's share of the grant is \$625,000, but we have to put up 60 per cent of the amount which has to be spent in five years, the road problem is a serious one for our people. The building of these roads under the joint supervision of the Federal and Provincial Governments has been carried on quite extensively. In view of the character of the material available the work has to be confined to "earth" or "dirt" roads. The speaker emphasized the need of co-operation of autoists.

HONEY CROP OF 1921 IN BRITISH COLUMBIA.—The British Columbia honey crop of 1921 amounts to 309,074 pounds, a gain of 33 per cent over last year's crop, according to statistics issued by W. J. Shppard, provincial apiarist. This, however, is below the record figures of 1919, which was 344,580 pounds. At 29 cents wholesale the current crop is worth \$86,631. Apiaries increased during the year from 1,986 to 2,072, and hives from 9,537 to 10,329.

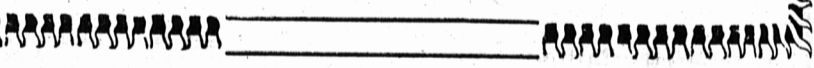
