Liberals Retain Two Seats In Commons

The Liberal Party captured two seats in the Commons yesterday, one of which gave a Cabinet member a seat in the House of Commons. Newly-appointed External Affairs Minister L. B. Pearson won out by a solid margin in a contest with two other candidates in the Ontario constituency of Algoma East, and a second Liberal standard-bearer, W. A. Boucher, was victorious in the Saskatchewan riding of Rosthern.

In both by-elections the standings showed the Liberals on top by a good margin, the C.C.F. second, and the Social Crediters third and last.

Early Resignation Of Mr. King Forecast

LONDON, Oct. 25—(CP)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King will resign office within a week or two after he returns to Ottawa from London, it was learned on good authority today before the convention.

Minister of India, visited him for the second time today and Prime Minister Liaquat Ali Khan of Pakistan made his first visit. Later in the day the University of London conferred upon Mr. King the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws. The ceremony took place in the Prime Minister's suite, with Mr. King sitting in an armchair. The scarlet and blue LL.D. hood was placed over his shoulders by the Earl of Athlone, Chancellor of the University and wartime Governor-General of Canada.
