Enroute To Meet Fiance In Montreal

HALIFAX, Dec. 20 (CP)—

Yvonne Arsenault, 22-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Arsenault of Summerside, is enroute to Montreal on a two-months' visit to meet her fiance, a New York surgeon. She will arrive in Montreal tomorrow night. Mrs. Arsenault, dark-eyed native of Vienna, arrived here last week but was refused permission to enter the Dominion. Yesterday, however, an immigration board's ruling was reversed.

Daughter of an anti-Nazi, she had to leave Austria last spring after the German annexation. She went to London where she made her home and her fiance, whose name she would not disclose, left for New York where he is practicing law.

After two months' schooling in the Laurentians, Miss Arsenault said she would return to London.

Directs Probe

Brien McMahon, Assistant United States Attorney General who came here from Washington to co-ordinate the federal activities against the bootlegging and rum-running racket, said today that "their ill-gotten gains are mostly gone."

"They didn't live lavishly either," he said. "We have reason to believe much money was used for promoting favorable legislation everywhere for price-fixing on liquors. We are particularly interested in what happened in western states."

"Our inquiry is already under way from the Pacific coast eastward, and including Washington."

McMahon said there also was some indication that the Musca brothers who had their connection with a \$1,000,000 swindle a quarter of a century old under different names and pedigrees, were probably forced to pay blackmail.

Millions in Ill-Gotten Gains 'Lost'

Widespread Investigation Launched To Ascertain Facts In Musica Tangle.

NEW YORK, Dec. 20 (AP)—The nation and Robbins Drug Company by the notorious self-declared Swindler, F. Donald Coster-Musica and others have been mostly tricked away, federal investigators indicated today.

Great sums mulcted from the \$87,000,000 firm, the U. S. Attorney is probing activities in virtually every state and in Washington.

The three surviving Musica brothers, all masquerading under assumed names along with Coster-Musica, who resigned the McKesson & Robbins presidency by suicide last Friday, are held in default of \$100,000 bail each.

count Runciman, Lord President of the Council, and Earl Winterton, Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster. This report is considered likely of fulfillment, perhaps after the visit to Rome next month of the Prime Minister and Foreign Secretary Viscount Halifax.

If resignations are to come from the "revolt" they may be delayed until the end of the year-end recess.

Oppose Early Election

It is understood Mr. Chamberlain opposes an early election because it would check the rearmament program which is the major consideration of the Government at the present time. Meanwhile he is continuing the investigation of the charges made by the insurgent junior ministers.

There is no doubt that a feeling of uneasiness over the progress of rearmament is held by a section of the Government. Their fears are not being allayed by the fact so much of the work being accomplished is not disclosed.

The general attitude of the Ministers that Parliament must leave things to them is not popular with supporters who argue greater steps should be taken to stimulate public interest and confidence in rearmament.

The day-long debate on national service was no less for lack of unanimity on the desirability of the necessity of a compulsory register.

For the most part, Labor and Liberal members stoutly opposed putting registration on the basis of force and the bulk of Conservatives agreed with them.

Ernest Brown, Labor Minister, outlined a scheme to create a "dun-garage army" to keep the wheels of industry moving in wartime. He would be list of reserved occupations compiled, from which recruits for the active defence forces will not be accepted.

"The industrial front in the next war will be the key defensive front," said Mr. Brown who was a corporal in the Great War.

His plan is intended to ensure that vital industries are not stripped of skilled mechanics in wartime such as happened in 1914 and 1915 when munitions and other key industries suffered through a rush of employees to the colors.

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
