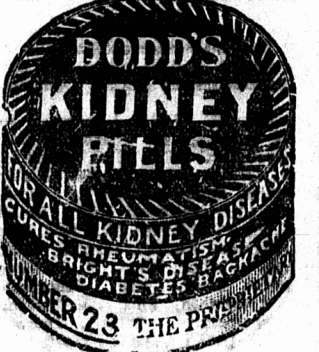

CRUSHED TO DEATH ON STEAMER MONTREAL

MONTREAL, July 8.—The steamer Montreal, of the C.P.R. Atlantic line, which arrived today from Antwerp, reported the death by accident on the voyage of Bert Varney, Sixth Engineer, who fell into the crank pit and was crushed to death. Varney was 21 years of age and belonged to West Cowes, Isle of Wight. He was making his first voyage on the Montreal.

THEIR MAJESTIES WILL OPEN IRISH PARLIAMENT.

LONDON, July 9.—It is decided to ask the King and Queen to open the



first Irish Parliament in Dublin. Home Rule Bill is now in something like its final form. With Redmond as the first Premier it is believed that T. P. O'Connor will succeed him as leader of the Nationalists in the Imperial Commons. It is expected that royal assent to the Home Rule Bill will be given about next June and the act come in force in February, 1915. It will not likely be put in effect till after the general election of that year.

TWO AVIATORS KILLED IN GERMANY

WURTZBURG, Germany, July 8.—The German aviator Lendner, with a Frenchman as a passenger gave an exhibition aeroplane flight this afternoon as a feature of the Folkfest. The machine capsized at an altitude of sixty feet and both men were killed.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. HENRY PETERS.

At the early age of 28 years, Mr. Henry Peters, after a brief illness, passed away at his home in Irish town on Monday evening, June 30th. Mr. Peters who came to Irish town about ten years ago possessed an excellent character and his genial disposition won for him a host of friends, all of whom grieve over his early death and feel that by his demise, a true friend and pleasant companion has been taken from their midst.

The funeral which was largely attended took place to St. Mary's Church, Indian River on Wednesday morning, where a Requiem Mass was said by the Rev. Mgr. D. J. Gillis, who also officiated at the grave. Besides his wife and little son of four years Mr. Peters is survived by his father and five brothers. The father and three brothers reside in Rogarville, N. B., and two brothers in Bedeque.

METHODIST CHURCH MOVING PICTURES

TORONTO, July 8.—That the Canadian Methodist Church has gone into the moving picture business, and hopes eventually to possess a chain of theatres in all the principal cities of Canada, is the statement made here by a morning paper to-day. The movement started in Vancouver where an option is held on a site on which it is proposed to erect a \$100,000 building for the showing of educational and humorous films and for institutional work. Dr. F. C. Stephenson, head of the Methodist Young People's Work, stated last night that he was going to England this summer to negotiate with several firms and missionary societies with the object of forming a film exchange and association. As sufficient funds are forthcoming a special operator will be sent to eastern countries to make exclusive pictures for the Canadian Methodists.

THE BOY'S HOOP KILLS TORONTO'S RAPID TRANSIT. TORONTO, July 8.—The real romance of Toronto street railway's so-called rapid transit system came out to-day in an interview with the general manager, Robert J. Fleming. The story reads like a fairy tale, but it is real matter of fact. A boy trundling an iron barrel hoop along Keele street at 5.57 o'clock last evening, conceived the idea of converting the hoop into an aeroplane, and with all his force he threw his hoop into the air. But it struck the power lines of the Toronto Power company, and an instantaneous and heavy short-circuit resulted, paralyzing the service in the city and interrupting the Niagara circuit. So heavy, indeed, was the shock and short-circuit caused by that seemingly harmless hoop that the "surge" killed two wires and broke down the insulating service at four sub-stations. Thousands had to walk to their homes as the power was off altogether in several sections of the city.
