Which are being reserved by the Inspector General, Francis Arthur Aglen, for the payment of loans and indemnities. This seems to be the beginning of foreign interference in the financial affairs of China. Certain members of the National Assembly are advocating the discontinuance of the body because a large majority of the elected members have left the capital. Those who remain are chiefly the Throne's appointees, and the Assembly is without a quorum.

Reports reach here of the murder of a German in Shen Si, and of a French priest in Sze Chuen province, but these are isolated instances of harm coming to foreigners, who have been well protected considering the excited condition of both revolutionaries and Imperialists. No attempt is being made to re-establish telegraph communication or the postal service in the Western Provinces. On this account on late communications have been received from many places where foreigners reside.

According to consular reports, 30,000 Imperial troops at Hang Chow, capital of Che-Yang provinces have joined the rebels and defeated local troops from Nanking and Ching-Kiang at Chiang-Kiang, a city in the province of Kiang-Su, 45 miles east by north of Nanking. The combined forces are now marching on Nanking, where a battle with the Manchu army is impending.

The organization of the Cabinet as now stands was evidently an attempt to include in its personnel representatives of all parties. The question arises whether Yuan Shi Kai was unable to force his inability to operate such a cabinet, if it could be actually formed. Opinion is divided with respect to the object Yuan Shi Kai has in view.

Some think that he has lost his astuteness and intuition while others hold that he is playing a deep game. His real object may be to convince the throne that a capable cabinet cannot be formed, but he gives the impression to visitors, both Chinese and foreigners, that he is determined to defeat the Rebels.

BEATTIE, WIFE MURDERER, MUST DIE NOVEMBER 24

RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 15.—Governor Mann today declined to interfere in the case of Henry Clay Beattie, Jr. and the young wife murderer's last hope of escaping the electric chair on Friday, Nov. 24 was swept away.

"I followed this case during the trial as its horrible facts were developed, regretted that a crime so cruel and malicious should have occurred within the confines of this State. In the discussion of every question which was presented to the able and impartial judge who presided at the trial, he was careful to give the benefit of every reasonable doubt to the prisoner; that he did not err is shown in the refusal of the Supreme court of appeals to grant a writ of error.

"That Beattie is guilty of the wilful, deliberate and cruel murder of his young wife, I have not the slightest doubt, nor is it insisted that there shall be any greater relief offered than the commutation of his sentence to imprisonment for life.

"I do not think the affidavits of Paul Beattie printed in the papers, or any other evidence or consideration brought to my attention, sufficient for that purpose.

"To grant a respite in so plain a case would be to set a precedent, would be to temporize with the law and to encourage appeals to the Supreme court with the sole purpose of gaining time. I believe the best way to prevent such crimes as this is to punish them adequately, certainly, speedily. Therefore the judgment of the circuit court of Chesterfield will be carried into effect without interference from me."

PEKING, Nov. 17.—Premier Yuan Shi Kai's new cabinet was named in the Imperial Edict, but it is questionable whether they will stand. One of the members expressed amazement at his appointment. Few of the new Ministers had been consulted and a number of them will decline to serve.

SIENKIEWICZ WOUNDED

NEW YORK, Nov. 16.—The New York Sun prints a special cable dispatch from Lemberg, saying that Henryk Sienkiewicz, the novelist, author of "Quo Vadis," was shot while shooting pheasants on Tuesday. The shooting was done by another of the party who aimed at a pheasant. Some of the shot lodged in the novelist's forehead near the left eye and his knee also was injured. He is now in a hospital at Warsaw.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 16.—Abraham Lewis Kalinsky of Baltimore, who recently celebrated his 117th birthday anniversary, and who is said to be the oldest man in the United States, was found starving by a neighbor, who heard the wails of his wife, who was afraid to leave the dingy hole in which Mr. and Mrs. Kalinsky live, lest serious harm befall the aged man.

Through the kindness of the local charity organization the centenarian was given a bounteous meal, the like of which he declared he had not enjoyed for more than six months. Although the father of three children, 28 grand-children, 25 great-grand-children, and numerous other descendants, none of his family has done anything to help him. They have left him and his wife, who is but 59 years old, in an odd little hovel in the rear of a tenement house at 106 Albemarle street. Yet with all her misery Mrs. Kalinsky told visitors that her married life was happy. She said that if she and her husband could only get food each day she would enjoy life.
