Local Car Dealer Reports Extent of Ford War Work

Mr. S. R. Johnston, well-known local car dealer, spent Monday in Saint John attending a general meeting of Ford dealers of the Company's Saint John branch territory which includes the Maritimes and adjacent points in Quebec.

Mr. Johnston is enthusiastic about the 1942 Ford and Mercury cars which he claims are the finest his company has ever produced.

"Of course, with the company's manufacturing plant so extensively engaged in war work, the supply of new cars will be drastically curtailed. However, the new models are designed, built and styled for long life and economical service," said Mr. Johnston.

In addition to having a preview of the new cars, Mr. Johnston heard addresses by R. M. Sale and E. F. Millard, company executives from Windsor, Ontario, and saw a motion picture showing the extent of war production in the great Ford plant at Windsor. Nearly 13,000 workers are busy day and night producing equipment for Empire armaments.

"The Ford company in Canada is the largest single source of military automotive equipment in the British Empire and has already supplied our fighting men with more than 100,000 fighting machines."

"Ford in the United States is now producing 1,850 and 2,000 horse-power engines for war planes. There is also a mammoth bomber plant nearing completion for the production of B-24D bombers, and plans are underway for the production of medium and heavy tanks in Ford's immense Rouge plant in Detroit," Mr. Johnston reports.

No foreign planes Over Northland

OTTAWA, Oct. 22.—(CP)—The Royal Canadian Air Force said tonight in an official statement that "reports of foreign aircraft seen flying over Canada's northland are completely groundless."

"The only aircraft of a foreign power that have flown over Canadian territory since the war began are those of the United States," the R.C.A.F. said.

The statement said all reports of strange or foreign-looking aircraft had been carefully investigated and "in every case where an aircraft was involved it proved to be a Canadian or American aircraft."

The statement did not say why the denial of these reports had been made.

(A news story of Oct. 14, not carried by The Canadian Press, quoted a Hudson's Bay Company official as saying that a number of unidentified airplanes and boats, possibly enemy craft, had been sighted off Baffin Island, in the mouth of Hudson Bay, in recent months.)

Canada had a civilian aircraft detection corps which had already demonstrated its efficiency, and which would quickly notify the proper authorities if any strange aircraft were seen.

Text of the R.C.A.F. statement follows:—

Reports of foreign aircraft seen flying over Canada's northland are completely groundless.

The only aircraft of a foreign power that have flown over Canadian territory since the war began are those of the United States.

All reports of strange or foreign-looking aircraft have been carefully investigated, and in every case where an aircraft was involved it proved to be a Canadian or American aircraft.

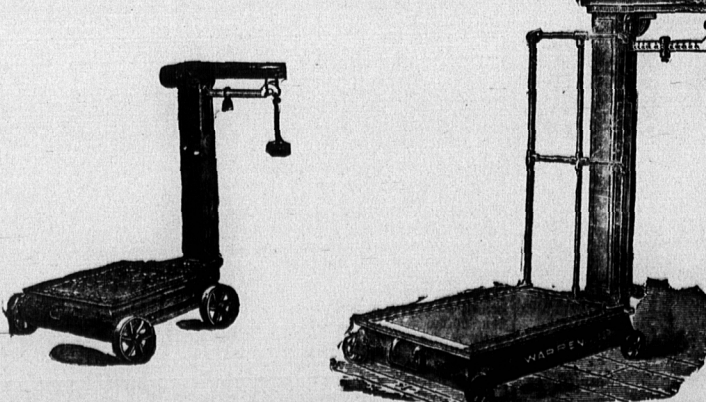

Weygand confers With Vichy Cabinet

VICHY, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Gen. Maxime Weygand, commander in chief of French troops in Africa, laid plans for maintaining Vichy sovereignty in Africa before the cabinet Saturday, well informed sources said.

At the same session, they said, vice-premier Jean Darlan brought the cabinet a personal report on renewed negotiations between Vichy and German representatives in Paris. After the meeting, Dr. Serge Huard, secretary of family and health, and Jean Barthel, secretary of communications, left for Paris.

The French people received their first official news of resumption of diplomatic relations with Germany when the government announced that Krug von Nidda had been named German representative to Vichy. Von Nidda thus occupies a position corresponding to that of Fernand de Brinon, who represents the French government in the German-occupied zone.

Weygand was said to have reviewed for the cabinet a complete schedule designed to continue the
