In Memoriam

J. HERBERT GILLIS

The passing of J. Herbert Gillis will call for more than passing notice as the death of such a person as Herb as he was intimately known will not be felt in his own neighborhood but throughout the entire province. With the exception of his trips through parts of Canada and the United States, Mr. Gillis lived and died on the same farm on which he was born, fifty-seven years ago. He was the son of the late John Gillis who predeceased him thirty-three years ago and Annie (MacLeod) Gillis who survives him, together with two sisters, Mary, Mrs. John Robert Ross of Pinette, P. E. I. and Mrs. Murdoch J. Cameron of Quincy, Mass., also one brother, Hector A. Gillis of Boston, Mass., who came by plane to attend the funeral.

In 1926 Mr. Gillis married Miss Annie Martin of Yarmouth, P. E. I., and to them were born three children, viz. John Martin, "Bert" Alexander, and the late Mrs. Gillis. The sympathy of the entire province goes out to the bereaved family in their great loss of a kind and loving father. Mr. Gillis took an active part in political circles where his opinions were regarded with the utmost respect. As his neighbourhood has lost a good neighbour so has the province lost a great citizen.

The funeral was held from his late residence at 2 p.m. on Monday afternoon. The service was conducted by the Rev. Mr. E. E. Evans of Belfast Presbyterian Church and Rev. Mr. Webster of Orwell United Church. The burial was in the cemetery in Belfast. The services at the grave were held by Mizpah Lodge No. 17 of Masters of which Mr. Gillis was a member. They were conducted by Past Master J. J. Larrabee who for many years was associated with Mr. Gillis.

Four members paid membership fee. Collection for the evening amounted to \$1.88.

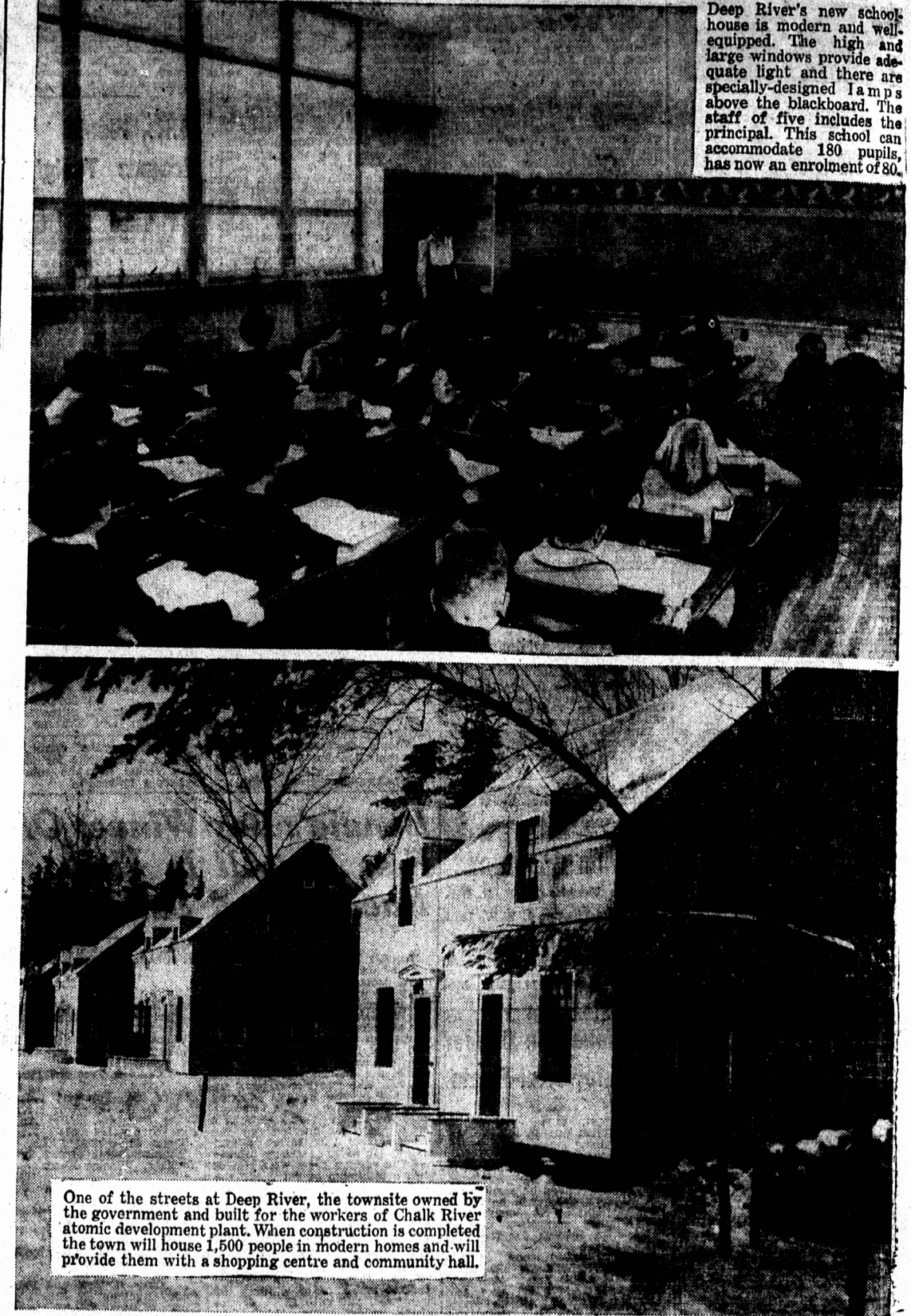

Modern Community for Atomic Research Workers
Deep River, Ont., Owned by Dominion Government



Deep River's new school house is modern and well-equipped. The high and large windows provide adequate light and there are specially-designed lamps above the blackboard. The staff of five includes the principal. This school can accommodate 180 pupils, has now an enrolment of 80.

One of the streets at Deep River, the townsite owned by the government and built for the workers of Chalk River atomic development plant. When construction is completed the town will house 1,500 people in modern homes and will provide them with a shopping centre and community hall.

DEEP RIVER, Ont., Feb. 19—(CP)—Atomic research at nearby Chalk River is being accompanied by an experiment in housing and community life at this newly-created village, 125 miles west of Ottawa on the Ottawa River.

On a one-mile stretch of river shore 1,200 persons now are making their homes in the village of Deep River and by September the population is expected to be increased by 300. Work on the carefully planned townsite started less than a year ago to provide living accommodation for personnel of the National Research Council and Defence Industries Ltd., employed at the Chalk River atomic research plant.

The site was carefully selected, it is roughly triangular with a mile-long base on the curving shoreline where there is a wide sand

beach. Near the centre of that base is the heart of the village—a modern six-room school, a fully-equipped hospital, a staff hotel, a community shopping centre and administration offices. After the town is completed it will include 461 housing units and a community recreation centre.

The entire village is government-owned and business places will be leased on a concession basis. Rental for houses ranges from \$24 a month for a four-room apartment to \$65 for a large four-bedroom house. The town is managed for the government by Defence Industries Ltd.

Although construction still is underway the Deep River residents have already plunged into a busy program of community activities including regular movies and dances, skiing, skating and hobby clubs.
