**Siki Will Fight Carpentier For "Glory Alone"**

PARIS, Dec. 10.—Batling Siki has accepted the challenge for a return match with Georges Carpentier, conditions upon his relinquishment of the French boxing federation. He says he is willing to fight for "glory only" thus waiving all the money demands for which he has hitherto held out. In sporting circles, however, it is generally conceded that the fight cannot possibly take place until the boxing federation has completed its investigation of Siki's charges that he had agreed to a "frame-up" in order to get Carpentier into the ring the first time.

**TO CRUISE B. C. COAST**

OTTAWA, Dec. 9.—The Naval Service Department has approved the following programme for H. M. C. S. Patrician:

Leaves Esquimaux 5th December and reaches Prince Rupert, 9th December. On the way she will visit Comox, Alert Bay and Kluks Tso-Ali. Returning, will leave Prince Rupert on 11th December, calling at McLaughlin Bay, Nanaimo and Vancouver, arriving at Esquimaux on 18th December.

The trip is planned to give the officers of the ship an opportunity of studying the navigation of British Columbia's inside channels, and the crew will perform the usual sea exercises.

**Says Marriage is Best State**

LONDON, Dec. 12.—Do single people live longer than married? Two of Britain's most famous doctors — Bernard Hollander, renowned alienist, and Sir Bruce Porter, head of the army medical service — have been discussing this question in public and in both cases their answer is a strong negative.

Both begin by dismissing the subject of unhappy marriages, which from their experience, they are inclined to view as an almost negligible percentage.

"I treat the matter from a homely human point of view," says Dr. Hollander. "Married life, first and foremost, conduces to comfort; it conduces to regular habits in sleeping and feeding; it promotes public morality.

"The bachelor is apt to become careless with regard to his health. But the wife makes it her first care to watch over her husband's health, and once a man is married, he, too, takes greater care of himself that he may not fall in his duty to those toward whom he has responsibilities.

"Home life is one of the greatest ingredients of health. What married man does not look back with loathing to the interminable succession of meals taken in restaurants? What thought did he give to his diet?

"Not only physically, but also mentally is this wisely companionship a boon. Are not most elderly bachelors and spinsters, too, unhappy? Very few bachelors of my acquaintance who have passed the age of 50 can honestly say they are completely happy.

"My married friends of the same age, on the other hand, are mostly in full enjoyment of life, kept healthy and contented by their family interests."

"Cellbacy, to me, is a new prescription for old age," says Sir Bruce.

"I have met men who attributed their longevity to beer; others to teetotalism; others to cold baths; but this is the first time I have ever heard any suggestion that bachelorhood led to old age.

"Day by day, with scapel and microscope, we explore that strange and still uncharted continent, the human being. More and more, as our pilgrimage advances, do we realize the mingling of mind and matter.

"And marriage is a mental upheaval far greater than a physical one.

"It follows that the married man is a different thing from the bachelor. He has a different mind, different interests and this mental atmosphere reacts on his physical being.

"The married man of 40 is not only more likely to live longer than a bachelor of the same age, but he is younger in himself. The great secret of course, lies in his children.

"Man containing two germs on their way through the ages, the germ of mind and the germ of the body, should pass these on as his motif.

"After middle age he lives a great deal in the future.

"When he has children and can see in them the next links in the chain there is much joy in life in helping to make these links stronger so that they in turn shall keep the chain unbroken. The bachelor must have the feeling of regret that in his case the motive does not run in and with him, the chain ends.

"Youth begets youth as sure as sunshine breeds health. Age is a question of environment.

"Love is a great factor in health. The average old bachelor is the saddest thing in life. Curled up in his chair, forlorn, disconsolate; he is a derelict, with no star by which to see his course.

"We live, to a large extent" because we want to live. And when the motive has gone life stagnates."

**HEAVY TOLL OF TUBERCULOSIS IN PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.**

MONTREAL, Dec. 12.—According to a report just issued by Dr. Jarry, chief of the Bruchesi Institute, 30,000 persons died from tuberculosis in the province of Quebec during the last ten years. He deplored the fact that Montreal is doing practically nothing to combat the disease.

**TEN LAKE BOATS ORDERED FROM BRITISH SHIPYARDS**

LONDON, Dec. 12.—British shipbuilders have been substantially helped by orders for ten steamers, each of 2500 tons, for trade between Buffalo and Montreal. The price amounts to \$300,000, and the contracts were placed by A. B. Mackay for the Eastern Steamship Company, of Canada.

**MILLIONS IN INSURANCE CARRIED BY THESE MEN**

NEW YORK, Dec. 12.—James C. Penney is today third among the millionaires in America on the amount of life insurance carried, Penney who is head of the J. C. Penney Corporation, which operates a string of clothing stores in twenty nine states, has life insurance totalling \$3,000,000. The largest individual insurance is that of Rodman Wanamaker, for \$4,500,000. Pierre Du Pont is second with \$4,000,000.

**INTEREST PAYMENTS INCREASE NET DEBT.**

OTTAWA, Dec. 12.—Heavy interest payments on the public debt during the month of Nov. are responsible for an increase in the net debt of Canada totalling \$21,876,792. On Oct. 31, Canada's net debt stood at \$2,399,759,026 while on Nov. 30 it totalled \$2,391,635,818.

**FRENCH IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS**

OTTAWA, Dec. 12.—A deputation from the Bonne Entente League (whose object is a better understanding between the two races in Canada) appeared before the management committee of the Public School Board recently to request that the French language be taught in the public schools as part of the school curriculum, and suggested that as a commencement, and also as an experiment, the language be taught in any one of the public schools for a period of say two years, to give it a fair trial.

The chairman of the management promised careful consideration of the matter.
