Competition for places on the team promises to be keen and excitement is running high among the players. It was hard to get them to leave the ice surface yesterday but today they will again workout at the same time from 12 to 1.

Almost every day one hears something about the fine spirit the boys possess and yesterday another example was forthcoming when Ossie Wood aspiring for a defence post got word of the practice at his home in Southport at 10 o'clock; someone with less enthusiasm for the game would have said "oh well there will be another" but Ossie just hitched up and was one of the first over the boards. For a while it was not known whether the clever centre would turn out or not but his presence at the session yesterday adds further strength to the team. Walter it will be remembered led the team to a Nova Scotia title in 1937.

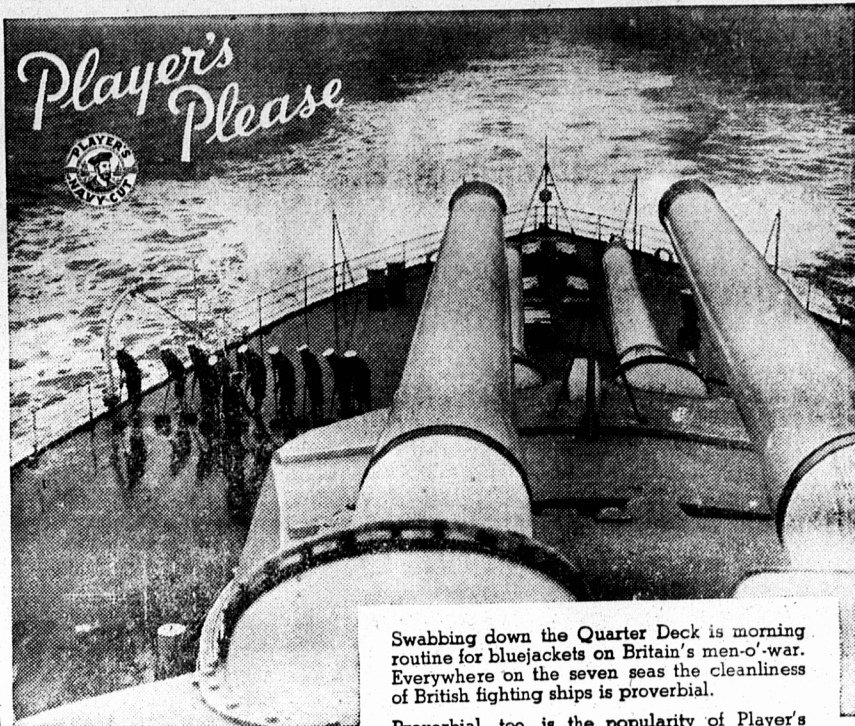
## Fighters All Ready For Scraps At The Sporting Club Saturday Night

## Make Change In Allocating Gate Receipts

**NEW YORK, Nov. 29—(CP)—**Governors of the National Hockey League today authorized a change in the allocation of gate receipts accruing to the players' pool in the Stanley Cup games to increase the amount for teams finishing first in the League schedule and cup play.

Frank Calder of Montreal, League President, said he thought that under the new pool division, a club which managed to win both the N. H. L. Championship and the Stanley Cup might divide as much as \$25,000 or \$25,000 among its players.

The Governors, at their monthly meeting decided to divide the players' pool into two equal sections, the first of which would be divided among the top six clubs of the seven-club loop on a percentage basis in relation to their final League standing.

The remaining half of the pool will be divided among the clubs participating in the Stanley Cup playoffs in ratios yet to be worked out but based on course on their order of finish in the various cup games.

It was also agreed that insurance be obtained on the lives of all players to insure against death from injuries that might be received on the ice. This, Mr. Calder pointed out, would obviate the necessity of a trust fund for benefit purposes, and he said the dependents of any player who died from hockey injuries would be the beneficiaries of such insurance.

Players incapacitated by hockey injuries for any length of time would not receive any benefit from the proposed insurance but Mr. Calder said the League had always taken care of such cases in the past and would continue to do so. He said the League would set aside a portion of the yearly receipts for a contingency fund which Mr. Calder said, would be used to meet any "disaster" that might occur.

## Canadian Team Presented With Pistol Trophy

**WINNIPEG, Man. Nov. 29—**The Commonwealth Trophy emblematic of the pistol championship of the British Empire, which was recently won by the Canadian pistol team, was officially presented to Captain E. G. Pickrel, captain of the Canadian team, last night by A. E. Warren, vice-president of the Canadian National Rifle Association.

The trophy was presented to the Canadian Association by S. J. Wood, chairman and President of the Canadian National Rifle Association, for annual competition of pistol teams within the British Empire and this is the first year that the trophy has been presented in first place within a margin of 31 points over Great Britain with India in third place.

Information has now been received that next year other teams to compete will be from Australia, New Zealand, Hong Kong, British West Indies, South Africa, Kenya and practically all other crown colonies.

In presenting the trophy to Captain Pickrel, Mr. Warren expressed the regrets of Mr. Hungerford, not being able to be present, and said that the trophy was presented to this magnificent trophy and brought the first championship to the Dominion of Canada," declared Mr. Warren.

"As future competitions are held this trophy will no doubt travel to various parts of the British Empire and we are all proud of the fact that the name of Canada occupies the first place. This trophy will be another ambassador of goodwill and will play its part in forging the links of the Empire closer together. Canada congratulates the Canadian team on its splendid victory," said Mr. Warren.

The presentation coincided with the official opening of the new C. N. R. indoor rifle range and among those who took part in the opening ceremonies were Captain H. D. Barbour, president of the Winnipeg Revolver Club; Inspector Stelfox, Winnipeg, City Police; Inspector Anthony and Superintendent Smith, Royal Canadian Mounted Police, and many others prominent in revolver and pistol shooting circles.

Dr. Glen Murphy who is an expert in the study of ballistics, fired the first shot to open the range. Following the opening a special series of exhibition of target shooting was given by Grant Miller and Miss Sue Hillis and Luke Cusson and Miss Mardi Gale, well known local rifle shots.

## Six Top Teams Selected For "Bowl" Games

**NEW YORK, Nov. 29—**The post-season football market did a thriving business today when six top teams announced their acceptance of invitations to play in four intercollegiate "bowl" games on Jan. 2. The acceptances followed closely on the selection of Duke and Southern California yesterday as rivals for the Rose Bowl classic at Pasadena, Calif.

Latest addition to the list of "bowl" combinations were: Texas Christian and Carnegie Tech, Sugar Bowl at New Orleans; Tennessee and Oklahoma, Orange Bowl at Miami, Fla.; Texas Tech. with no rival named as yet for the Cotton Bowl at Dallas, Tex., and New Mexico, also looking for an opponent for the Sun Bowl at El Paso, Tex.

Four of the six are unbeaten and united T. C. U., Tennessee, Oklahoma and Texas Tech—and three of the four still have a game each to play. Tennessee, champion of the southeastern conference, has Mississippi to dispose of Saturday, while Oklahoma, big six title winner, and Texas Tech have engagements the same day with Washington State and Centenary, respectively.

Texas Christian and Tennessee, while they have accepted bids, must await final approval of their action by the other members of their conferences. In each case, however, this is regarded as a mere formality.

Holy Cross was being sought as the opponent for Texas Tech in the Cotton Bowl, with Utah, champion of the Rocky Mountain big seven, the leading candidate for the Sun Bowl game with New Mexico.

Attending physicians said the Quebec City fighter, knocked out by Leopold (Young) St. Laurent of Quebec, had regained consciousness only for a "brief spell" since he was carried from the ring after he was carried in the third round of the scheduled six-round bout.

Warner, a promising amateur, was making his professional debut when he was smashed to the canvas early in the third round by a left to the jaw. Up to then, he had been in no trouble, except for a nose-bleed.
