THE opening of Summerside harbor by the Stanley yesterday was the earliest on record. The following are the dates of opening for the past twenty years:—1881, April 25; 1882, May 11; 1883, April 23; 1884, May 23; 1885, April 27; 1886, April 26; 1887, May 7; 1888, April 12; 1889, April 17; 1890, April 19; 1891, April 23; 1892, April 13; 1893, April 18; 1894, April 23; 1895, April 22; 1896, April 21; 1897, April 23; 1898, April 17; 1899, April 26; 1900, April 8; 1901, April 15.

THE death of Mr. John McClure occurred Thursday about noon, at the age of eighty eight. Mr. McClure was born at Cavendish and moved to Summerside about a year ago where he purchased the Dr. Covey property and resided. Besides a widow he leaves four sons and three daughters, John living at Fifteen Point and Mrs. James Bishop at Wellington the other members of the family live in the United States.

THE Stanley having broken the bridge at the entrance of Summerside harbor there is nothing to hinder an early departure of the ice inside which is now only waiting favorable wind and tide to carry it out. There is considerable ice yet at Point du Chene although reports say not. However the annual official announcement of its clearing has not yet been received as that port usually opens before Summerside the welcome word may be expected in a day or so.

THE Stanley had little difficulty in making entrance to Summerside Harbor yesterday and arrived at Railway wharf at 1 p. m. She left Pictou at 6 o'clock in the morning and steamed up the Strait without encountering any ice until at the mouth of this harbor where the usual bridge was met. Little trouble was experienced here, however, and it took but 1 1/2 hours from the board ice to reach the wharf. The steamer will be loaded with 10,000 bus, oats and will sail for Pictou possibly this afternoon.
