WINNIPEG, May 11—(CP)—Late buying on the Winnipeg holiday covering today, when pre-wheat prices from more than three cent losses which followed bearish week-end weather reports.

Canadian wheat export purchases for the United Kingdom and Germany, estimated at 500,000 bushels, steadied prices and at the close values were 2 to 1-2 cents lower with May at \$1.27 1-4, July \$1.26 and October \$1.16 3-8.
