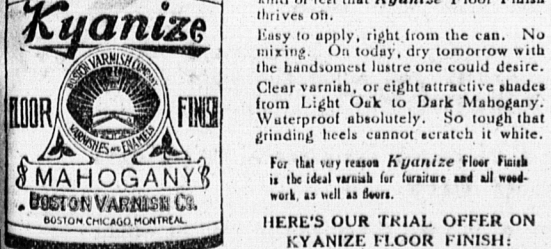

IN MEMORIAM

MR. JAMES F. DOULL

The funeral of Mr. James F. Doull took place on Thursday the 22nd inst. from his late residence on Mackay St. to Brookside Cemetery. The services at the residence were conducted by the Rev. Robert Johnson, of United Church members of the choir assisting. Many old friends of the deceased attended the services and the members of Norton Lodge, I.O.O.F., attended as a body. There were many beautiful floral offerings.

Mr. Doull was born in New Glasgow in 1842 and with the exception of a period in his early youth, had resided continuously in the community. For over forty years he was in business for himself and previous to that period he was associated with a cousin, doing business under the name of Doull and Blackie. He retired in 1916. He was four times married, the death of his last wife taking place less than a year ago. He is survived by five sons and two daughters: John, barrister, of New Glasgow; Evan, manager of the Royal Bank of Canada at Perth, Ontario; James, a physician on the staff of the John Hopkins University; Roy, in the employ of the Canadian National Railways at Toronto; Wesley, employed at the quarantine station in Halifax; Mrs. George Polgarth of New York and Mrs. W. C. MacDonald of Saskatoon—New Glasgow, N. S. Chronicle, Dec. 27th, 1921.

The late Mr. Doull above referred to was a brother of Mr. Augustus Doull, New Dominion, this province with whom he spent several weeks last summer while on a visit to the Island. Other relatives reside in Cape Traverse whom he visited on that occasion.

JAMES FLYNN

Once again for the fourth time in the lapse of a few months the angel of death visited Charlottetown, this time claiming for its victim James Flynn, after a short illness of a few days, and on the 20th of March his soul passed to his Heavenly Maker. During illness he was visited from time to time by his pastor, Rev. Dr. Gillis. Although of quiet disposition he was a man who was much liked by all who had the pleasure of knowing him for he was ever ready to give a helping hand.

The high esteem in which he was held by all was shown by the large number of people who, through the roads were in very bad condition, turned out to attend the funeral. The late Mr. Flynn was 73 years of age, he was born in Vernon River, P. E. Island. 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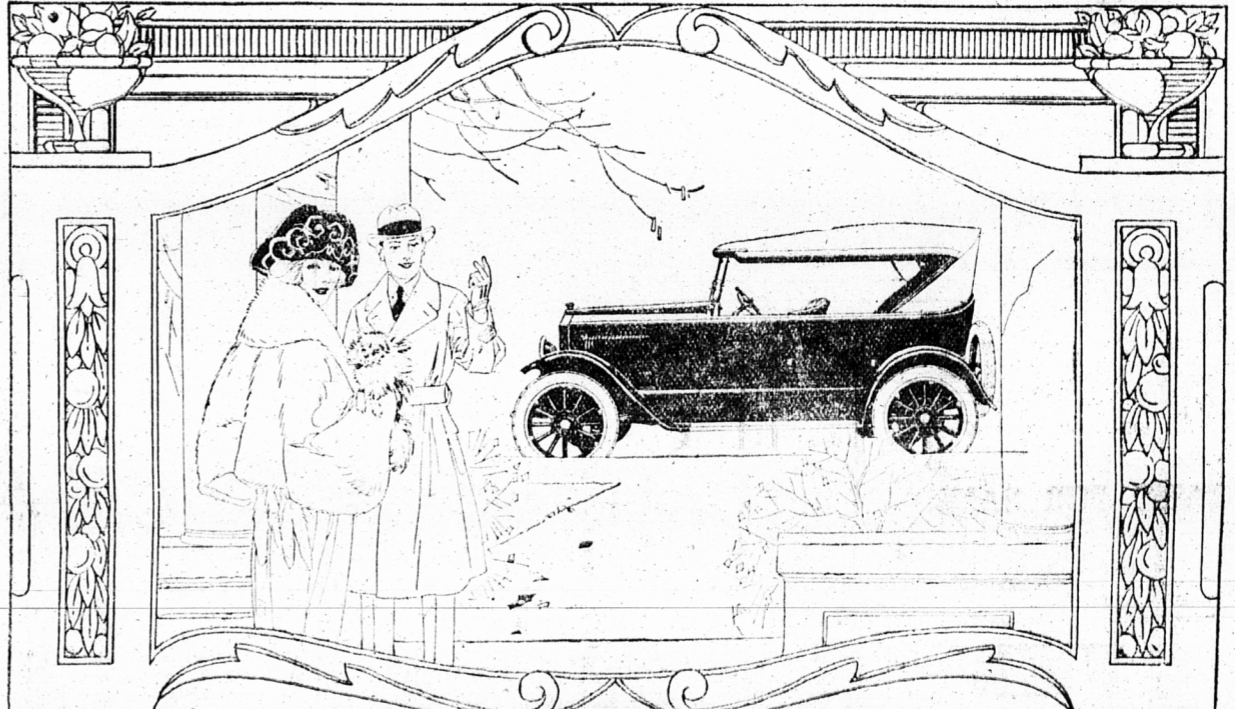
