JAPAN'S PLAN OF CAMPAIGN IS NOW FULLY DEVELOPED

Will Prevent Invasion of Korea by Russians—Jap Navy Doing Wonders—How Russians are Deceived—Russian Torpedo Boat Sunk—Official Report Shows no Japs Killed.

JAPAN'S CAMPAIGN.

TOKIO, Feb. 27.—(Special).—The preliminaries of Japan's campaign on land are developed sufficiently to render it practically impossible for any formidable invasion of Korea by Russia.

RUSSIANS MUCH DECEIVED.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 27.—(Special).—Russians think Japan will not undertake to land troops just now.

JAP NAVY DOING WELL.

LONDON, Feb. 27.—(Special).—All advices show the Japanese navy is fulfilling its mission of keeping the Russian fleet inactive while the Japanese army movements are being prepared and probably carried out in the successful landing of troops.

THE OFFICIAL REPORT.

The Japanese official report of the sinking of ships at the entrance to Port Arthur shows the work accomplished without loss of life but did not effectively block the channel.

TO WIN BATTLES.

MOSCOW, Feb. 25.—The most sacred image in Russia has been sent to St. Petersburg, and it will be taken later to the Far East with the army. This image is a representation of the Virgin appearing to St. Sergius, and is always kept at the Troitzko monastery. It is about one foot square and is covered with precious stones. The image has a remarkable history. It accompanied Alexis, Peter the Great and Alexander I. on all their campaigns.

A silver tablet attached to it enumerates the battles at which the ikon was present.

IRRITATION AGAINST THE U. S.

ST. PETERSBURG, Feb. 25.—The irritation against the United States on account of the supposed unfriendly attitude of that country toward Russia, which was slightly noticeable through-out the negotiations, seems to have become daily more pronounced, and since the Vicksburg incident at Chemulpo (when the commander of the American gunboat is said to have refused to unite with the commanders of other foreign warships at Chemulpo to protest against the Japanese firing on the Russian warships Variag and Korietz, and the fact that the Vicksburg did not take on board survivors of the Russian ships). American business men here are really alarmed concerning the possible effect upon American trade. Within the last few days orders for American goods have been countermanded, the only explanation given being that the prospective purchasers did not desire to buy American goods under the present circumstances. U. S. Consul General Watts has been appealed to in the case of an American firm which had a large contract having been peremptorily cancelled. Orders for the importation of a big consignment of wood pulp have also been countermanded, the intending purchaser saying in his letter that he could not be expected to do business with America after the Vicksburg incident, Mr Watts has felt it

to be his duty to write to the state department, pointing out the state of public feeling here and the great prospective damage to American trade unless measures were taken to allay the irritation. Americans here believe that an official explanation of the Vicksburg incident would be opportune and have an excellent effect.

Few as are the people who can imagine a battlefield on shore, they are vastly fewer who can picture with any certainty the scene of a naval conflict. And this, of course, more so now than ever it has been before. In the days when Britain fought the sovereign Power at sea, and her wooden walls were handled and fought through whole days in closest proximity with their enemies, it often befell that ships bulled through and through with shot drifted for many days, while the handful of unwounded survivors accomplished tasks such as make the mind reel to think of.

chapel-houses, when the battle was over, there was hardly any other term applicable.

The modern man-of-war will not, at any rate, prolong the agonies of her crew when she is scuttled. She will go down quick into the pit in a halo of steam, a whirling vortex of waves, and in five minutes from the commencement of her downward plunge there will be no sign that there has ever been, and only if other vessels be very near will there be any possible chance of saving the handful of stalwart swimmers whom super-human struggles have wrenched them clear of the devouring, down-dragging eddies. More than a mere handful there could not be in any case, since another tremendous difference between past and present sea fighting is that the steel-clad monster goes into the battle with hardly a man visible, almost all of them hidden behind massive walls, shut in from the devastating impact of large projectiles, as well as the horrible hail of Hotchkiss and Maxim bullets.

And to add to all these terrible conditions of modern sea warfare we have now the submarine. Not content with the mighty arena of conflict afforded by the open surface of the sea, in gale, or fog, or calm, the sea fighter must now descend into darkness and silence, the realm of the utterly unknown, in order that he may haply hurl at one fall blow as from a bursting volcano, into blazur, boiling ruin and death, eight hundred lives, and the revenue of a principality. For man has even extended the battle-ground of the sea.

Then, when the battle is joined, the seaman must needs have a heart of brass encased in triple steel, a mind that refuses to meditate upon the immediate possibility of one of those terrible twelve-inch projectiles plunging down upon his vessel's deck, and out, amid the disintegration of all her ganglions of energy, through the bottom, rendering her an easy target to an uninjured foe, and her sinking a matter of minutes.

THE SWIFTESS OF DEATH.

And when she sinks, stone-like—pumping being, if possible to a yet undamaged engine, a manifes absurdity in that rent fabric of steel—with her must go all of her crew. STATE CAPITAL OF WISCONSIN
