MRS. JOHN R. COFFIN

One of the oldest and most respected residents of Fortune passed away recently in the person of Mrs. Marjory Coffin. She was the daughter of Donald and Annie Smith of Belfast, where she was born in 1850. Removing to Bay Fortune in 1873, she married John R. Coffin and has lived in Fortune ever since.

She has been a most useful and self-sacrificing life. She nursed an aged stepmother and, later, her husband, through long illnesses. 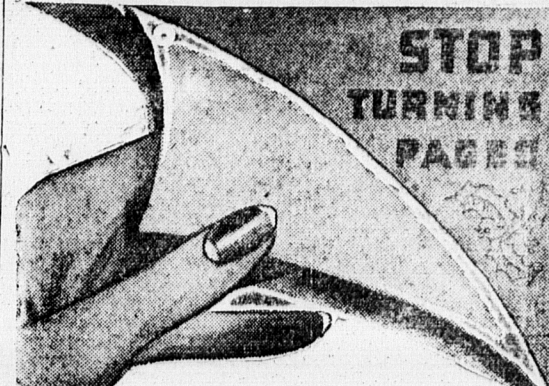
