Dr. Grant Lathe Addresses Rotary

The war will last two to five years and will end with a Chinese victory. It would be brought to a close in a few months if the western nations cease to send war materials to Japan.

This was the statement made by Dr. Grant Lathe of Montreal, Secretary of the Canadian Student Association, who was the guest speaker at the Rotary Luncheon yesterday.

Dr. Lathe in the course of his address stated that in spite of the destruction of more than two thirds of the universities and colleges of China, the students have not become demoralized, but rather have become more grimly determined to free their country.

But educational work among the peasants has become the chief extracurricular activity.

The mass education movement thus started has come to include almost all the Chinese people.

Dr. Lathe who is a native of Ottawa, but whose headquarters are at present in Montreal, as secretary of the Student Association graduated with the degree of M. D. C. M. from McGill University last fall, after returning from China and Japan as a delegate to the assembly.

A federation of the clubs and societies of the different universities and colleges in Canada had been formed at the Montreal conference of Canadian Universities at Winnipeg, and it was decided to send delegates to the Orient for the purpose of extending sympathy and greeting of the students of the western world to Chinese students, and to bring back the report of the work of these students at present.
