Annual Meeting Of Kings County Conservatives

The annual meeting of the Kings County Progressive Conservative Association was held in Cardigan hall on Thursday with a representative attendance. Mr. Leslie Hunter presided in the absence of the president, Mr. Leith Townshend.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read by Secretary Henry Mallard and approved, after which the following executive was appointed:

The executive will meet later to elect officers for the ensuing year.

Hon. Dr. W.J.P. MacMillan, provincial party leader, gave a vigorous address, reviewing activities at the last session of the Legislature, and emphasizing particularly the gravity of the debt situation.

He also stressed the need for organization work in King's County and the importance of having the Federal party candidate nominated in preparation for a Federal election next year.

Mr. W. Chester S. McLure, M.P., reviewed some of the important problems facing the taxpayer, such as income taxes on farmers and fishermen, high cost of living and the "white-washing" job which was done in Parliament by the Prices Committee. He denounced the method of imposing taxes by order-in-council which he declared was totally at variance with Parliamentary practice. He stressed the growing menace of Communism in Canada and charged the Liberal party with having received active support from Communists in one Federal by-election.

Mr. H.F. MacPhee, K.C. thanked the people of King's County for the support given him in the last Federal election. He gave some valuable suggestions with regard to improving the party organization in King's.

Mr. Reagh Bagnall, Provincial president, dealt with the plans of the Provincial executive. An outline of plans for a complete re-organization of the party throughout the province was given by the Provincial secretary, Mr. Joseph A. MacMillan.

Brief addresses were given by Senator J.A. MacDonald, Dr. A.A. MacDonald, Messrs. E.L. Burns, M.L.A., John MacLean, M.L.A., R.R. Bell, M.L.A., John MacLean and Murdoch McGowan.

During discussion of business, three amendments to the constitution were presented and adopted.
