CATHEDRAL HEATING SYSTEM.—A commencement has been made by Messrs Bruce Stewart & Co., with the installation of the system of heating for the Catholic Cathedral that is being rebuilt. It is only a small portion of the work which has been executed now, that which has been rendered necessary through the progress of the reconstruction of the building; a number of pipes that are to go under the concrete floors being laid down. The main part of the work will not be undertaken for some time yet.

AMALGAMATED.—Regarding the statement made in these columns a few days ago that arrangements were being made for the amalgamation of one of the Island's fox companies with a proposition that is now being organized to carry on general fur farming, it may be stated that they have been completed and the company hitherto known as the Black Foxes, Ltd., possessing four pairs of silver-blacks, has been merged into the General Fur Farms, Ltd., which is now in course of flotation. Nearly three-fourths of the new concern's capitalization has already been subscribed and this week workmen commenced the construction of the extra ranches that will be needed for the stock that the company propose to start business with. The ranches of the General Fur Farms Ltd., will be situated at the same site at which the Black Foxes, Ltd., have their foxes reared, at Lewis's farm, Brighton. The prospectuses of the new concern have been issued and are being distributed and are being read and elaborately got up. It is understood that the proposal is to allow the shareholders of the Black Foxes, Ltd., a footing in the new company equal to that that they held in the other business.

AUTO SCHOOL.—With regard to the suggestion made some time ago respecting the formation of an auto school, at which owners, drivers and chauffeurs may be qualified in the handling and driving of the machines, a movement is now actively being made towards that end. The school will be formed if fifty members are obtained, and already twenty persons have signified their intention to enrol in the school. The school will be furnished with a chassis and body of a car for the purpose of demonstration to the pupils, and further it will have the use of four motor cars which will be lent by obliging owners. It is the intention to put in charge of the school the best instructor that can be got for money from one of the leading auto schools in other parts, and the school will likely be opened on the 1st January next, the intention being to conduct it in the Lyceum. The course at the school will be eight weeks long, and the fee for the course has been fixed at \$25, which will include the cost of books to be supplied free to the pupils. It is proposed also to teach the working of stationary gasoline engines, and arrangements have been made with Messrs Bruce Stewart & Co., for the loan of engines for demonstration purposes in this regard. The organizers of the school are Messrs C. L. Grant, S. A. McDonald, F. M. Stewart, C. J. Reiley, W. G. Hogg and W. B. Prowse.

A PLEASSED VISITOR.—The Rector of Bathwick, England, (the Rev. C. Hilton Stewart), who visited Canada during the past summer has given a glowing account of his tour to the Bath, (Eng.), Herald, for a copy of which The Guardian is indebted to Rev. L. J. Wason, Jerusalem, N. B., and formerly of this province. Mr. Stewart included Prince Edward Island in his itinerary and says of it, in part: "we reached Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island by the steamer across the Northumberland Straits, and by the most uncomfortable railway I have met. There again we had most glorious weather. I had not visited the Island since 1896, and even 17 years had brought a most wonderful change in the Island. The old wooden business houses had given place to very handsome stone buildings, and whereas formerly palings used to surround the yards of the houses, now they all have been removed and beautiful lawns put in, so that in driving through some of the streets you might almost be driving through the parks of a country town. Here we spent a few days, going back to Montreal."

WOOLEN MILL SCHEME.—Arrangements are well on the way towards the formation of a business to prosecute the manufacture of unshrinkable woolen underwear in Charlottetown. The proposal is to float a company with a capital of \$50,000, and to erect a mill in the city at which employment will be given to thirty hands, the number of whom may increase if the business develops. Business men of the city look with favour upon the project so already \$12,000 of the capital has been subscribed. The attitude adopted by the City Council recently in making some concessions to the company that is being organized to operate a rolled oats mill in Charlottetown has led the promoters of the present proposition to the belief that the City will not be adverse to making similar concessions to a business to be run on similar lines. Consequently arrangements are being made for a delegation from the promoters of the woolen mills business to meet the City Council at its next meeting and lay before it their claims to the concessions they seek, which it is understood consist of a free site, exemption from taxation and free water.

ANOTHER TORY MAJORITY CUT MORE THAN 300.

BRAMPTON, Ont., Nov. 4—With one poll to hear from, J. H. Fallis, Conservative, has a majority of 375 in the provincial by-election in Peel, defeating R. H. Miller, Liberal. This seat was vacated by Sam Charters, Conservative, who was appointed registrar of the county. Mr. Charters' majority at the last general election was 700.

TRIED EIGHT TIMES TO SWALLOW SNAKE.

MADISON, Wis., Nov. 4—Results of a scientific investigation of the capacity of birds to destroy insects were announced at the University of Wisconsin, by A. R. Cahn, assistant in the Zoological Laboratory. A Virginia wren, a marsh bird of half a pound weight, showed the remarkable ability for devouring pests. In a day the bird ate 144 amphipods, 12 mealworms, 12 water bugs, one water scorpion, 2 small sun fish, one and a half inches long, one stickle-back, a sort of fish 2 1/2 inches long, 1 caterpillar, and 15 flies. The second day, in addition to the menu of the day before, it ate 5 live hornets, 1 crawfish, two inches long; 1 frog, 1 1/2 inches long, and one grass snake eight inches long. The snake caused the bird some worry. But after the bird tried eight times to swallow the snake alive it finally killed the reptile and gulped the bird ate 144 amphipods, 12 mealworms, 12 water bugs, one water scorpion, 2 small sun fish, one and a half inches long, one
