THE QUEEN'S FUNERAL.

We trust that tomorrow, the day appointed for the funeral of the Queen and proclaimed as a day of national mourning will be duly observed in this City and throughout the Province. It is the last tribute of respect by a loyal people to the best of Sovereigns. At the end of so long, so glorious and beneficent a reign we rest assured that all our citizens will feel disposed to observe the day thus solemnly set apart.

Emperors and Kings of other lands, rulers and the great men of mighty states will follow the coffin of the good Queen to its last resting place. There will be enough of solemn and stately pageant, such as the world has seldom seen. But the truest and most fitting tribute that can be paid her will be the universal sorrow of her people in the many lands of the Empire. That sorrow, born of her great love and service and of our irreparable loss, should find its expression in the solemn observance of the day of mourning.

"Observer" writes to the Examiner to correct the newspapers for speaking of "the Emperor of Germany," instead of "the German Emperor," which is, by this critic said to be the proper title. The point would be rather a small one, even if it were well taken. Men of the Time, a standard British authority, in speaking of the head of the German Empire styles him "Emperor of Germany and King of Prussia." The Century Dictionary and Encyclopedia uses precisely the same words in the same order. It may be that Observer knows more about imperial titles than the newspaper people, but the latter appear to err, if at all, in pretty good company.
