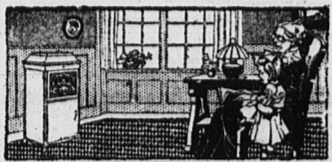
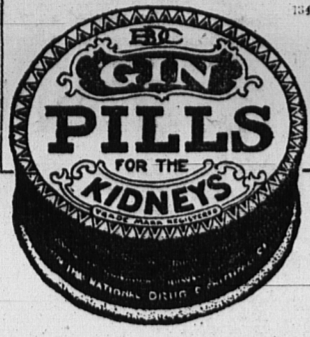

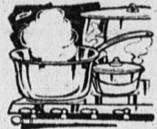

-WELCOME VISITOR.—It is now about ten weeks since Mr. B.L. Woodside arrived on the Island after being absent for a quarter of a century. During his absence he visited most of the principal business centres on the Island. Mr. Woodside has visited friends in different parts and is much impressed with the advancement made during the last 25 years, particularly that of farming and thinks P. E. I. is fully up to, if not equal to, any of the other provinces and says he, "Why should it not be?" You have the bone and sinew and the soil is better than most of the other Provinces. The brothers and sisters of Mr. Woodside together with many old friends, called on him Thursday at the residence of Mrs. Wm. Minto, Grandville Street, where a very pleasant social and reunion was held. Several short and pithy addresses were delivered, reviewing olden times, this mingled with music and singing made the day a very pleasant one and a day long to be remembered. Among those present were the brothers—Messrs. John A. Woodside, Kensington, T. Samuel Woodside, Clinton, Moses S. Woodside, with wife and family, Tryon, and the sisters—Miss Lois Woodside and Mrs. William Minto, Summerside, the only absentee of the family being Mr. J.C. Woodside of Portland, Me. A rare feature in connection with this family is, that no death has occurred therein, since more than 52 years when on January 20th 1865 the late William E. Woodside passed away, this record, perhaps is not equalled in Canada, their grand parents, both paternal and maternal were born in the year 1777, about 140 years ago. Besides the brothers and sisters mentioned who were present, many friends also called and joined the company for a few hours, among whom were—Doctor and Mrs. Darrach, Kensington, Rev. Mr. and Mrs. Rice, Summerside, Mrs. Sarah A. Bowness, Mrs. John Dobson and daughter, Summerside, Mrs. Wood, Wilnot, Mrs. W. Lea, Tryon. After partaking of a nicely prepared lunch and ice cream the party adjourned to the lawn where photographs of the family group as well as their friends were taken and before adjournment there was more music and song. An address delivered by Dr. Darrach, reviewing olden times was one long to be remembered and worthy of special mention. Among relatives of the Woodside family were—the late Hon. Jeremiah Simpson and the late William McNeill Simpson of Hamilton, both great temperance men each having served as Grand Worthy Patriarch of The Sons of Temperance. Also Mr. Lane Secretary of the Interior in President Wilson's Cabinet. Mr. B. L. Woodside himself is a loyal worker in the cause of temperance, although more than seventy years of age, he has yet to take his first glass of beer and whiskey.—H.
