his long political career to attack Communism - without naming Soviet Russia specifically - as a force which seeks world domination and to liken it to the tyranny of Nazism.

"Today," he told the delegates, "the signs of a new tyranny that seeks world domination are unmistakable. Communism is no less a tyranny than Nazism. It aims at world conquest. It hopes to effect its purpose by force. Its patterns of procedure are similar but they go further. They seek to create unrest in all quarters of the globe, and by devious underground and underhand methods, to penetrate and undermine the established social systems of many lands."

"So far as may be possible in freedom-loving nations, Communism seeks to unsettle and undermine, where it does not openly defy, the authority of government itself."

"The world today is in an appallingly dangerous condition," said Mr. King as he called upon the "free" nations of the world to "maintain a preponderance of military strength on the side of freedom."

"The United Nations, in my opinion, will be well advised to concentrate upon the organization of the international force which, in the words of Lord Tennyson, it was to 'hold a fretful realm in awe.'"

Other Speakers Mr. King was preceded by Health Minister Martin who, speaking in French and later in English, said the secret of Liberal leadership has been its refusal to recognize extreme positions put forward in the name of race, religion, economic and sectional interest.

"Man's struggle against his insecurity has shaken the foundations of modern society, but we in Canada have been delivered from the dangers of Communism and alien and desperate measures by the social legislation with which we have corrected the balance of Canada's economy and made this country the envy of the world."

Hon. Milton F. Gregg, who entered the Cabinet two months ago as Fisheries Minister and yesterday became Veterans Minister in a three-way Cabinet shuffle, also spoke.

Mr. King, devoting much of his address to the important problem of prices, said he believed the "mere existence" of a parliamentarian committee, to say nothing of its work, will help to "slow down the increases, and in cases where, for example, there has been or is hoarding or profiteering, to effect a reduction in prices."

But the "real cure" for high prices is production, not only in Canada, but in the countries with which Canada trades. That is why the restoration of Europe matters so much to Canadians, to their daily lives, to their cost of living. On the other hand, the cure for profiteering was exposure to the "glare" of an aroused public opinion, which, as well as being aroused, also should be intelligently informed.

At the same time, it would "wholly destroy" the value of the proposed committee were it to be made an instrument for what he called "hunting, or a vehicle to embarrass unnecessarily any legitimate business, or any individual."

No properly-conducted business should have anything to fear through the committee's activities.
