Supt. D. A. MacNeill Enjoys Southern Holidays

MONCTON, N. B., Nov. 2.—"One of the most delightful of holiday trips" was the comment of D. A. MacNeill, superintendent, Canadian National Telegraphs, Moncton, on his return to the city after covering approximately 7500 miles on a vagabond cruise from Montreal to the British West Indies and British Guiana by the passenger-carrying freighter "Colborne" of the Canadian National Steamships, Captain John Hubley, Master.

"We left Montreal on September 17th," Mr. MacNeill said, "and in the course of our cruise called at Halifax, Bermuda, Puerto Rico, Guadeloupe, Martinique, Barbados, St. Vincent, Trinidad, and Georgetown, British Guiana. On our return we sailed direct from Barbados to Charlottetown, P. E. I., 2,068 miles, and from there continued on to Quebec and Montreal. "To a visitor from the North what strikes one is the diversity of native life, banana plantations, the grapefruit and orange groves in Trinidad also the pitch lake on that Island, and the scenic beauty of all of the Islands. Another interesting phase of the cruise was the method of loading and unloading ships, in some cases lighters being used to transport cargo to and from the Islands. At Barbados it was quite a sight to see natives rowing a lighter containing puncheons of molasses out to the ship." At Martinique, Mr. MacNeill visited Empress Josephine's monument, Napoleon's first wife, of which island she was a native. "The Islands gave every evidence of growing prosperity," Mr. MacNeill continued, "and trade appeared to be good. There is a great interest in Canada, wherever we visited the people expressed a desire to see Canada. There is a good demand for Canadian goods which is fostered by the efficient direct service provided by the "Lady" liners and freighters of the Canadian National Steamships."

Declares Present Working Of Creditors Act Unsatisfactory

The following is from the Summerside Journal of recent date: Senator Creelman MacArthur arrived in Summerside recently from Ottawa, making the trip from Moncton by aeroplane. The Senator states that he interviewed several of the ministers in practically every department on various matters requiring attention, the principal one perhaps, being that with reference to the Farmers Creditors Arrangement Act, the actions of the Board in regard to which, according to the Senator, have been extremely unsatisfactory in this province. He was assured that in future there would be a great improvement in the manner in which cases would be handled.

Mr. H. F. Gordon, Administrator of the Act, and instructed the Receiver and the Board as to what was the intention of the Act and that he had many complaints of great injustice having been done to the creditors by the decisions. In this connection an indignation meeting was held in Summerside recently and another meeting is to be called, which will likely be held shortly in Charlottetown at which all interested will be invited to attend and make representations.

There was one case, said the Senator, where an accredited representative was threatened that he would be expelled from the court and the chairman took occasion, when acting in a subsequent case, to say that he did not wish to have any more selfish creditors appear before the Board.
